Happy Anniversary! As the *Messenger* goes out today we mark the actual date of the founding of FCC, January 24, 1869. During our stewardship campaign last fall we had the theme "Honor Our Past, Embrace Our Future." As we officially enter our 150th year we are invited to embody this theme. There will be a variety of ways in which we'll "honor our past." In regular columns in the *Messenger* we'll be highlighting various aspects of our history. The 150th Anniversary Celebration Committee is also working to plan a variety of events throughout the year that will "honor our past." A weekend visit in September from our General Minister and President Rev. Terri Hord Owens will be another way in which we'll "honor our past."

It's not enough to simply "honor our past." We do this as a way of acknowledging our present reality and "embracing our future." Celebrating 150 Years with Notes from Our Past

Four of our congregation's early leaders were quoted in the last edition of the *Messenger* about their opinions on the church's new publication in 1907 called *The Church at Work*.

Here's a bit more information about two of them.

Ashford Bird Critchfield was born in Ohio in 1856 and moved to Cass County after he married. He farmed and taught school and was elected County Clerk for 2 terms. He became a leading lumber man in the state and served as secretary of the Nebraska Lumber Dealers Association. He was a founder of a couple of lumber companies, including Lincoln Lumber and Coal. He served as a deacon here and chaired the building committee for the 14th and M Street church. The window in the North Hall depicting the Parable of the Sower: "Some Fell by the Wayside" was given by him. He died suddenly in 1912 and some of his descendants still reside here in Lincoln.

George Lobinger was born in Pennsylvania in 1832, taught school and practiced law for seven years before preparing for the ministry. He studied at Hiram College in Ohio where James A. Garfield (later president of the United States) was his instructor. He held pastorates in several states and in Canada and preached both in New York City and Washington, D.C. while James Garfield was a member of Congress and a regular attendant. While preaching in Thayer County, Nebraska, he was elected and served four terms as a County Judge before moving to Lincoln. He died in 1909 and the Parable of the Sower: "Some Fell of Good Ground", already installed in the 14th and M St. church, was given in his memory.

Check out the windows given for these leaders next time you're in the North Hall; you'll hear more about these and other members from our past as we continue our 150th celebration.

Now, some more information found in *The Church at Work* - a total of \$8 was collected from 376 people who attended Sunday School on January 17, 1909. "Bible School Para-graphs" included this: "When order is called please come forward and sit down. Don't visit then – don't buzz, don't laugh, don't walk around, don't talk, don't go home. It is too late to get out then. The only way is to drop into a seat and stay for Sunday School. Say, you make so much noise with your feet. We must begin a gum shoe campaign or be lost in the roar. Let us each one take notice to soften down the intensity of our individual personalities – in fee, gesture and voice."

"Migrant Journey"

Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me. Matthew 25:40

Traveling as individuals, migrants are vulnerable and exposed to kidnappings, extortion, rape, murder and disappearances. Now they embark on the road in groups to protect themselves and each other.

There are networks of shelters throughout the migrant route. In Guatemala City, one shelter, Migrant House, is close to the Ecumenical Christian Council of Guatemala. It welcomes migrants and offers humanitarian aid (clothing, food, mats, psychologists, pastors, priests, young people, and even a hairdresser), creating an oasis in the desert of this tortuous pilgrimage.

María, mother of a 7-year-old daughter from Tegucigalpa shared, "I bought and sold cucumbers, but many times they did not sell and spoiled. My grandmother raised me and was my only family. Now, I have three daughters. I'm leaving my land to find work and help my grandmother. My two girls, 12 and 9, stayed with my grandmother." Between tears and sobs, María said, "I have to support my grandmother and consider my girls' futures. I want a better life."

"When I saw others leaving, I decided to try, too. So far, it has been difficult. When we reached the border of Guatemala, we crossed the mountain. The hardest part was walking all day. We stopped when it was raining to shelter the children while we got wet in the open," María continued.

The director of Migrant House said that after war, Hondurans, Salvadorans, Guatemalans and Nicaraguans expected their governments to be allies of the needy. Instead, they established a market model that favored private industries. Mass human migration is the cry of the poor and excluded who will no longer endure violence and poverty.

Hope is in awakened people who hear and live the gospel in which Christ, the migrant, announces redemption and invites others to follow. We walk with them, and we accompany María and her daughter on this pilgrimage. Let us unite in this journey and offer what we have to transform the borders of death into bridges of life.
