Celebrating 150 Years with Notes from Our Past

As we prepare for the mayoral election on May 7, here is an article from the May 6, 1927 edition of The Church at Work:

Newly Elected Mayor of Lincoln One of Our Own

Verne Hedge, the newly elected mayor of Lincoln, has been a member of First Church for many years, having united with the church in 1893. His father, Porter Hedge, now deceased, was very active in the church. His mother, Mrs. Martha Hedge, still living in the family home, 1845 Washington Street, is one of our most loyal members. A son, Willard, is now a member of the Official Board of the High School Department of our Church School. First Church is happy indeed, that this honor, so welldeserved, has come to one of her very own.

Foundation Facts

The Board of First Christian Church Foundation of Lincoln is made up of nine members serving threeyear terms, two members being elected annually by the FCCF Board and one by the FCC congregation. Current officers, each elected for a term of one year, are: Donald Everett, Jr., president; Dick Pickel, vicepresident, Monte Dietrick, secretary; and Marj Snodgrass, treasurer.

Of the initial board members in 1964, only Raymond Calkins, a resident of the Legacy, is still living. Ray served many years as attorney for the Foundation. Inez Shepard served as the first president of the Foundation, becoming treasurer in 1969 and continuing in that role until her death Jan. 18, 1991.

Pastor's Corner

Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. *Colossians 3:13*

In my previous Pastor's Corner I invited us to ponder the process of repentance and forgiveness as outlined by Marjorie Thompson in her six-session study entitled "Learning Forgiveness: A Lenten Study." Whether we embrace this process as individuals or as part of a community, it is critical for our growth as Christians. She invited us to begin by spending some time in selfreflection. It's important to be aware of our feelings and experiences, then we can ponder how they guide our actions, often unconsciously. When we are able to fully embrace our experiences and feelings we can move on toward healing and a fuller life.

Session four of this study outlines a three-step process for seeking forgiveness from others.

- Acknowledge a particular offense and be willing to take responsibility for it.
 This involves admitting that real injury was done, a relationship damaged in some way—in dignity, respect, or trust. It also involves saying "I did this."
- Show a visible feeling of regret or shame. This means it is clear to the
 offended party that the offender is personally affected by what she or he
 did and is troubled by it: "I am sorry for what I did, and regret the suffering
 I caused."
- Be vulnerable to the offended party. This means offering no defense of oneself, standing exposed and vulnerable to the response of the offended person. An apology is offered with no guarantee of acceptance; forgiveness may be begged for and refused.

This is a particularly challenging process because it requires our willingness to be vulnerable with another person. Once we have sought forgiveness we then must trust in God's grace and mercy. Sometimes the most difficult part for many of us is truly trusting in this gift of forgiveness and then letting go.

Session five describes the process we can follow to give the gift of for-giveness. Thompson reminds us that forgiveness isn't simply a nice idea; Jesus calls us to forgive. She also tackles the difficult issue of the struggle we often have to forgive another person. Sometimes we simply aren't ready. For many of us, the most difficult person to forgive is ourselves. Hearing the stories of those who have moved through this process can inspire us. Many of us were able to hear Pardeep Singh Kaleka at the Mayor's Interfaith Prayer Breakfast on Friday, April 12th. His father was shot and killed while worshipping in the Sikh Temple in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in 2012. His journey toward forgiveness was truly inspiring and moving. Our community of Lincoln will also have the chance to experience the exhibit "The f word: stories of forgiveness" which will be at Gateway Mall from April 26 - May 16.

In the sixth and final session, Thompson invites us to think about the relationship between forgiveness and reconciliation. I suspect she would be the first to acknowledge that the journey towards forgiveness is a challenging one but well worth the effort. However we move through this process, on our own or as a part of a community, we are empowered to do so by our loving and forgiving God.

As we move through Eastertide, we are invited to embrace the new life that comes with resurrection. Learning to let go and forgive often ushers in this new life for us and others. May repentance and forgiveness be a part of our journey, not just during Lent, but also during this season of love and new life.

Our May Act of Kindness Opportunity



The Bridge Behavioral Health located at 721 'K' Street will be the recipient of our Act of Kindness Collection Barrel for the month of May.

The Bridge started more than 30 years ago when a group of community members created Cornhusker Place - a non-profit agency with the purpose to deliver a Civil Protective Custody program as an alternative to jail. This safe, medically-supervised program provides intervention, care coordination and education when chronic addiction or episodic alcohol abuse endangers lives. The Bridge is a professional, nationally-accredited treatment center, specializing in treating alcoholism and drug addiction. Experienced clinicians create effective, customized treatment programs for each individual.

From its quiet beginning, *The Bridge* has grown to become a comprehensive behavioral health service provider by offering residential treatment, medical withdrawal services, outpatient services, respite care and recovery support for men; women have a separate location in Lincoln providing similar services. Supervised family visitations are allowed during the treatment and recovery process to observe how the family interacts and determine what long-term transition might look like.

Items that are needed at *The Bridge* include:

- Plastic coat hangers only (for the client clothing donation closet)
- Clean socks for men
- New underwear for men boxers, briefs, white t-shirts (all sizes)
- Jeans, shorts new or gently used (all sizes)
- New or gently used men's scrubs for clients to wear on admission
- Lightly worn shoes
- Regular size body wash, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes
- Adult and children puzzles
- Inspirational books; children's books; "G" rated DVDs; toddler age toys
- Spring plants, foliage, pots, for entryway and patios
