# Celebrating 150 Years with Notes from Our Past

We are quickly approaching Pledge Dedication Sunday for our annual stewardship drive known as <u>Embrace our Future</u>. As we contemplate how much we will give to support our congregation's essential ministries, it is interesting and informative to look back to where we were at another time.

The October 18, 1929 edition of *The Church at Work* contained the following information about our congregation just a few days before the Stock Market Crash and the beginning of the Great Depression - -

Church membership had reached 1,142 with an annual operating budget of \$16,281. Pastor Ray Hunt was paid \$4,800, the organist and choir director made \$1,416 and the custodian earned \$1,140. Electric/gas/fuel cost \$1,250 and the church budgeted \$50 for repairs to our brand new building at 16th and K.

The most revealing statistics showed that 464 pledges had been received and each person who pledged was listed along with the amount they pledged and how much they had paid on the pledge. Pledges ranged from \$1.75 per year to \$780.00, with the average gift of \$35.00. One hundred thirty four people were in arrears at the end of the church year. A few names on the list will be familiar to some of us today, so stop by the church library and check out who gave what if you're curious.

Times have changed. We no longer list individual givers, the amount they pledge and how much they actually gave. However, supporting the ministry of our historic congregation has never been more important.

Finally, those of us who yearn for "the good old days" might want to be careful about what we say or our names and the amount we give just might show up in **The Messenger** some day!



For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

I Cor. 11:23-26

One of the joys of serving this congregation as pastor is presiding at the Lord's Table every week. In many traditions, the Lord's Supper is only shared on a monthly basis. In fact, in the Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren in the Czech Republic, many congregations only have Communion on a quarterly basis. So, I really enjoy the practice of sharing Communion weekly. It is intentional that the Communion Table is in a central location in the chancel and is raised up to be visible to all. The lectern and pulpit are on the same level to emphasize the equal importance of the proclamation of the Word and the sharing of the Word tangibly in the Lord's Supper.

Last Sunday, 27 October, we celebrated Reformation Sunday. One of the main issues of the Reformation was the importance of the Lord's Supper and it's availability to all. During the Middle Ages only the clergy could partake of both the bread and the wine. Reformers, like Jan Hus in Bohemia, insisted that Jesus shared both the bread and the wine with the Disciples at the Last Supper and so both elements should be shared as we celebrate that feast. The Reformers also insisted that the Church was called to be reformed and always reforming. As children of the Reformation, we are proud to be part of that tradition. We are part of the Reformed tradition and we are also "always reforming." Our practices around the Lord's Supper are often being reformed. We are called to reform as a way of remaining sensitive to the needs of those who worship, and at the same time, being aware of the theological foundations that ground us.

Here at FCC, reformation and change are not taken lightly or done frivolously. This congregation, like most others, has a process in place that oversees our life together. Leaders are elected by the congregation and others step forward to act on behalf of the Body of Christ's expression here at FCC. In consultation with me, as the pastor, and Mark Miller, as the Director of Music, the Worship Team attends to the worship life of this congregation. A great deal of thought and planning goes into worship since it is the very heart of what we do and who we are. In response to the desire to live out our call to be a community with a truly open and welcoming Table, the Worship Team examined our practices around the Lord's Supper. It was determined that it was important to have one type of bread available to all people, so after diligent discussion and searching, a gluten-free bread was chosen that was acceptable to everyone. This eliminated the need for different breads and the separation of those with gluten allergies and those without. It was also determined that one bread for everyone was a tangible expression of our call to unity at the Lord's Table. The challenge of course, is that change of any type is difficult for many of us. We also came to realize that perhaps we had not as clearly communicated this change as we thought we had. Reform and change are not done simply to shake things up. Reform is a way of striving to remain faithful to God's vision for us as a community of faith and as an expression of Christ's body.

As we gather together weekly to share in the Lord's Supper may we be reminded of all the ways this feast binds us together as the Body of Christ that is FCC and with the Body of Christ all around the world and throughout time.

# FINANCE NOTES 2019 BUDGET REVIEW

# 2019 is almost gone!

Here is a review of the 2019 budget. First Christian Church is extremely blessed to have several sources of revenue that help us pay for the budget we put in place each year. Your pledges are a majority - thank you!

As many of you know, running and maintaining the beautiful building that we worship in comes at a price. The 2019 budget was passed with 19% of funds unaccounted for, or what we'd call a built-in deficit.

There are two ways to cut into this shortage: our committees and teams can spend less than expected AND our congregants can give above and beyond. All of our committees have done an excellent job of coming in at or below budget, knocking our \$51,000 deficit to only \$19,800.



As of September 30, 2019, giving is behind nearly 13%. Also, as the cold weather months approach, our heating bills and other expenses will continue to roll in. We expect the deficit to grow to roughly \$25,000 by the end of 2019.



If you feel so moved, please consider an offering to help pay off 2019's budget deficit, so that we can all start 2020 on even ground.

### Answering the 2019 General Assembly's Call to See and Respond

October's Domestic Violence Awareness Month emphasis is just the beginning of learning about the issue that affects people across the spectrum of age, race, and economic status. An estimated 12 million people are hostage in toxic relationships. The dynamics are not logical and the complexities around abuse are not easily understood.

The authors of the 2019 General Assembly Resolution GA-1928: A Call to See and Respond to Domestic and Intimate Partner Violence, Courtney Armento and Rev. Yvonne McCoy, offer this advice:

1. Become educated about abuse specific dynamics and educate your community, especially youth and young adults

2. Take action to bring resources, workshops, and prayer events to your community

3. Stay aware and engaged, become a safer space to those in your midst

The resolution also includes additional actions and links to educational material.

In the final paragraph as adopted by the assembly, all expressions of the Church are called to "increase their spiritual support and efforts to shatter shame, stigma, and silence by preaching and teaching responsibly on the topic of domestic and intimate partner violence; create safe and sanctuary spaces for abuse-specific pastoral care, compassionate conversation, and healing for vulnerable victims and survivors; and work together to dismantle a cultural landscape where domestic violence can thrive and hide."
