Scriptures

Psalm 23

Ephesians 5:8-14

⁸ For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light— ⁹ for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true.

¹⁰ Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord. ¹¹ Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them.

¹² For it is shameful even to mention what such people do secretly; ¹³ but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, ¹⁴ for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says,

'Sleeper, awake! Rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.'

Reflection *"Meditation for the Fourth Week of Lent"*

In the introductory notes to the Letter to the Ephesians, the NRSV notes that this epistle is "a celebration of the life of the church." This letter was intended as a message for all the new churches in Asia Minor, not just the community in Ephesus. The author knows that these new communities of believers are struggling to create an identity.

Life in the first century was challenging, particularly for these new communities of Christians. Many of them faced challenging, and sometimes life-threatening, situations. They lived in dark times. As we face daily life in the shadow of COVID-19, we may have the sense that we are facing a dark time, too. Like the early Christians, we are also being invited to consider what it really means to be the church. This is undoubtedly a question all of us ponder, but I have to tell you, this is a challenging question for me as your pastor. For me, worship is the very heart of who we are and empowers us to do ministry in all its various forms.

The author of this letter reminds us that no matter how dark things may seem, the light of Christ still shines in our lives and in our world. In fact, the author is bold enough to say: "For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. "We may be keenly aware of darkness within and around us, but it does not have the last word. In God, we are light. In fact, the author goes on to use a beautiful phrase, we are invited to "live as children of light." We are invited to manifest this light by remembering that "the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true." So, if the darkness threatens to overpower us we are invited to look for all that is good, even in this strange and frightening situation. We are also invited to ponder what is right and true. There is a lot of misinformation out there, so we must sort through it for what is right and true. All this can be quite overwhelming, so sometimes finding the good, right, and true means limiting our exposure to it all.

So, as children of light, how can we let that light shine within each of us? One way would be to dare to imagine what church could be. Yes, corporate worship is important, but, it does not define us as the people of God. What defines us is our willingness to embrace our identity as children of light and as such, to shine God's light in our lives and in our world. For the next few weeks, worship will look a bit different. Instead of worshiping in our beautiful sanctuary, everyone is invited to worship virtually, with computers, tablets, and smart phones. We'll be sharing worship resources in a weekly bulletin/ newsletter format and in a short videos online. Hopefully, these resources will empower us to be the church for one another.

We're exploring a variety of ways to stay connected to God and to one another. Empowered by this time in scripture and prayer we're invited to reach out to one another, particularly to the more vulnerable in our community. Make a phone call, drop someone a note or an email, visit someone in person if you are able and feel comfortable doing so.

As we shine the light of Christ in the lives of others we'll undoubtedly find that the light of Christ blazes in our own lives, too. As children of light, may we celebrate our call to be the church, because nothing can quench the light of God!

Lectio Divina

("Holy Reading") A Way of Praying with Scripture

Psalm 23

Select a time and place that is peaceful, and in which you may be alert and attentive. Prepare yourself for prayer in whatever way is beneficial for you (e.g., addressing God, focusing on an image or your breathing, emptying yourself of thoughts, singing, etc.

- 1. Slowly begin reading a biblical passage, reading it again and again until a word or phrase strikes you, grabs you, invites you to it, or somehow seems to attract you. ("Lectio" = reading)
- 2. Enter into that word or phrase, and let it enter into you, by slowly, attentively repeating it again and again, ruminating over it. ("Ruminario" = rumination, chewing)
- 3. Reflect on, meditate on, what the word or phrase offers you, or on its meaning in your life, or on how you respond to it. ("Meditatio" = meditation)
- 4. Rest silently with God, contemplating God, waiting for what God offers, simply open to God without actively attempting to communicate anything to God. ("Contemplatio" = contemplation)
- 5. Actively express to God the prayers that rise out of your prayerful experience of the word or phrase. ("Oratio" = oration, spoken / communicated prayer)
