Scripture

Matthew 21:1-11 Jesus's Triumphal Entry Into Jerusalem

²¹When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, just say this, "The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately.' ⁴This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, ⁵ 'Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you,

humble, and mounted on a donkey,

and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'

⁶The disciples went and did

as Jesus had directed them; ⁷they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. ⁸A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, 'Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!'

Reflection

"Meditation for Palm Sunday"

The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Matthew 21:9

This year, Palm Sunday will look a bit different. No palm procession with the children, no crowds gathering for worship, no palm branches waving. This year, we're invited to a virtual parade, not necessarily on our computers, tablets, or phones, but in our imaginations. Although we cannot physically gather together in one place for worship, we can still worship and participate in this important part of the life of Jesus. In our worship material this week, we have another spiritual exercise to aid you. We are invited to participate in this event with our hearts and imaginations.

As the crowds gathered they shouted ""Hosanna to the Son of David." The notes in the NRSV indicate that this word "hosanna" comes from the Hebrew and originally meant "O Save!" Later it becomes "a cry of joyous acclamation." In fact, the author of Matthew seems to take this entire portion from Psalm 118:26. This Psalm is one of the readings for Palm Sunday and you may want to take some time to read it this week. One commentator, the author of The Anchor Bible Commentary on Matthew, notes that "hosanna" was originally intended as a "prayer for

deliverance" and literally meant "save now!" This commentator speculated that the passage should read "O Son of David save us" not as praise "to" the Son of David. So, at this point, you may be shaking your head and wondering where your nerdy pastor is going with all this. Well, I find it striking that those early crowds were really shouting out their distress and expressing their desire to be saved by God in the midst of their praise and celebration. Perhaps this passage is more fitting for our times than we had ever imagined. If there was ever a time to pray fervently to God with our desire to be saved, it would be now.

As this familiar passage draws to a close the author says: "When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."" (Verses 10-11). We are told that Jerusalem was "in turmoil" or, as our commentator from the Anchor Bible put it, the city was stirred up. We may not outwardly see the signs of turmoil but we all know it is present across the globe. In this time of turmoil we, like the crowd around Jesus, are invited to call out to God and to bear witness to God's coming in the Christ. Although we cannot gather in person, we are still called upon to proclaim the Good News of God's presence in our midst and in our world.

"Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" May these words ring in our hearts and across our world this Palm Sunday and always!

Imaginative Visualization

Matthew 21:1-11

Read through your text two or three times, to become familiar with it.

Use your imagination to enter into the scene you are reading about. What is the setting of the story? What are the sights, the sounds, the aromas? Who else is there in the story? What do they look like? What expressions do their faces reveal? Explore the scene as fully as you can with all your imaginative senses.

Where are you in the story, in relation to the other participants? Are you one of the religious leaders? A member of the crowd? In the foreground, or the background? What is your role in this drama?

Let the story unfold and develop in your imagination. Does someone speak to you? What do they say? What do you say in reply? Is there other action, and do you play a part in it? What are your feelings as the scene evolves?

After the action has concluded, what do you do? Do you go somewhere, or tell someone? What do you tell them about what you just experienced? How do you describe the meaning of what has happened?

Allow your attention to come back to the present, being open to any insights or questions that may have arisen.
