Scriptures

1 Corinthians 11:23-26

John 13:31-35

²³ For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, ²⁴ and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' 25 In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' 26 For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

³¹When he had gone out, Jesus said, 'Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. 32 If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. 33Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, "Where I am going, you cannot come." 34 I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.'

Reflection

"Meditation for Maundy Thursday"

In the age of physical distancing, the people attending the meal in the upper room would have incurred a fine for having a gathering of over 10 people. However, it's easy to forget that the meal we usually celebrate with a soup supper and a worship service was actually a small gathering of friends. Jesus gathered with those closest to him, his twelve disciples, and shared a Passover meal with them.

As we think about the Last Supper, it's easy to conflate all the Gospel accounts into one story line. Even so, each Gospel writer provided a unique perspective on that final evening Jesus spent as a human being. The passage for this evening joins an already well-developed story.

Jesus has gathered with his closest friends to share the Passover meal, but he adds a new element, he washes the Disciples' feet. He does this to model what he is telling them about the nature of love. Love, for Jesus, is more than a warm feeling of affection. Love involves serving God and one another. A theme that weaves its way

throughout this part of the story is the betrayal of Judas. Judas provides a counterpoint to the message of true love.

As we observe this night, perhaps on our own or with immediate family or dear friends, we are invited to embrace the meaning of this event. Not only are we invited to embrace this story, we are invited to participate in it. As we move through these days of self-isolation and physical distancing, we are invited to ponder the true meaning of servant love. We have a unique opportunity to imagine ourselves in the intimate meal with our Lord.

How might we show this kind of love in the midst of our current situation? It may be in actions as simple as sharing a meal. Tonight as you watch our worship video, you join all those who are doing the same. We may not be in the same physical space but we are bound together in love. I invite you to use your imagination, as I stand behind the Table you are spiritually invited into that space as well.

May the joy of a shared meal with our Lord and those we love empower us to serve in the true spirit of love.

Weekly Spiritual Practice

The Jesus Prayer

"The Jesus Prayer" refers to a short prayer, the words of which are: 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner,' constantly repeated. The Jesus Prayer is known to innumerable Orthodox and many other Christians as a form of devotion that can be used at any moment, whatever the situation. As Anthony Bloom notes,

"It is a very companionable prayer, a friendly one, always at hand and very individual in spit of its monotonous repetitions. Whether in joy or in sorrow, it is, when it has become habitual, a quickening of the soul, a response to any call of God."

The main emphasis is on the repetition of the prayer; it can be said while sitting, walking, or working, silently or aloud.
