Scripture John 10:1-10

¹Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit.² The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out.⁴ When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵ They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of

strangers.' ⁶ Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

⁷So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep.⁸ All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹ I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. ¹⁰ The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

Reflection "Meditation for the 4th Week in Easter"

When we think of this passage from John, I suspect most of us imagine this serene and idyllic scene. Perhaps we think of the stained glass window outside the Pastor's Study or we may have our favorite picture in mind. However, the scene Jesus creates for us was probably the opposite. Sheep are milling about bleating. There is anxiety in the air as rumors of thieves and wolves abound. Fear begins to settle upon them and the sheep become more and more restless. I love sheep, but they are not the smartest animals and they are easily affected by their surroundings. In the midst of all this activity and noise, the Shepherd expects the sheep to hear his voice. This seems like an unreasonable expectation to me.

Today we live in a world much like the one described above. Although we are all physically distancing and "sheltering in place" we may find there is a lot of chaos swirling around us. Perhaps the chaos is mostly in our own heads, especially if we live alone, or there may be a great deal of activity all around us as children struggle with school work and parents strive to work from home. Then there is all the chaos swirling around us on the TV, on social media, and even in the written word. Voices shout out with the hope of being heard and it is difficult to discern what voices we should listen to.

In the midst of all this chaos, then and now, we are still invited to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd. So, what does the Good Shepherd have to say to us in the midst of life's current chaos? The Good Shepherd gives us a lot of direction; this passage is filled with all kinds of action verbs. The Good Shepherd calls us by name, and we are invited to respond. The Good Shepherd leads the sheep and we are invited to follow.

So first and foremost, even amidst these fearful times, how do we make time and space to listen for and to the voice of the Good Shepherd? The ways in which we have done this in the past are not available to us now. We cannot gather for corporate worship, but we can participate in shared worship through our worship bulletins and our recorded worship services. Each week we invite you to practice a different spiritual discipline or exercise. Hopefully, these have enabled you to make time and space for prayer and for listening to the Good Shepherd's voice.

Perhaps, in these times of distancing and isolation, you have found or renewed practices that have enabled you to make time and space for God. Once we are able to listen for and to the voice of the Shepherd, then we can let Jesus lead. Are we really willing to follow, wherever that may lead us? Jesus may be inviting us to go in some new directions and create new paths, for ourselves, for our communities and, perhaps, for our congregation.

As this passage comes to a close, Jesus may say one of the most important things, "I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." While many of the things that have traditionally made for "abundant life" may be gone now, we can still discover what might make for truly abundant life. The Greek word used to describe this "abundance" can also mean over and above, more than is necessary, superior, extraordinary, surpassing, uncommon, more remarkable, or more excellent. Although this may not seem to be the case now, Jesus has come to bring us life that is beyond our imagining. Isn't that worth listening for his voice above the din?

May this season of our lives give us opportunities to listen for and to the Good Shepherd. May we take the time and make the space to open ourselves to the abundant life he promises for each of us, for our congregation, and even for our world.
