Psalm 116

¹I love the LORD, because he has heard

my voice and my supplications.

² Because he inclined his ear to me, therefore I will call on him as long as I live.

³ The snares of death encompassed me;

the pangs of Sheol laid hold on me;

I suffered distress and anguish. ⁴ Then I called on the name of the LORD:

'O LORD, I pray, save my life!'

⁵ Gracious is the LORD, and righteous;

our God is merciful.

- ⁶ The LORD protects the simple; when I was brought low, he saved me.
- ⁷ Return, O my soul, to your rest, for the LORD has dealt bountifully with you.

I walk before the LORD in the land of the living.

- ¹⁰ I kept my faith, even when I said,'I am greatly afflicted';
- ¹¹ I said in my consternation,

- ¹³ I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD,
- ¹⁴ I will pay my vows to the LORD in the presence of all his people.
- ¹⁵ Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his faithful ones.
- ¹⁶ O LORD, I am your servant; I am your servant, the child of your serving-maid.

You have loosed my bonds.

¹⁷ I will offer to you a thanksgiving sacrifice

and call on the name of the LORD.

in the presence of all his people,

¹⁹ in the courts of the house of the LORD,

in your midst, O Jerusalem. Praise the LORD!

Reflection "Meditation for 2nd Sunday After Pentecost"

In one of my favorite books on the Psalms, Longing for God: Prayer & the Rhythms of Life by Glandion Carney & William Long, the chapter for this Psalm is entitled "The Joy of Being Heard." As I read this it struck me how appropriate this chapter heading is in these days! Between the pandemic and the protests, people want to be heard. As we find ourselves more and more isolated by physical distancing, there seems to be a real hunger for many of us to be seen and heard. This also seems to be a central issue for those protesting, the desire to be truly seen, heard, and valued. Carney and Long point out how important it is for us to be truly heard. When we are genuinely heard we are valued. Our experiences may not be shared by others, but when we are heard, those experience are valued.

The Psalmist reminds us of the value of being truly heard by God. The Psalmist begins by saying: "I love the Lord, because he has heard my voice and my supplications." This powerful experience of being heard by God brings the Psalmist, and hopefully us, to a point of praise and joy. Such an experience also opens us up to the desire to truly hear and listen to others. Just as God values us enough to hear our voice, we come to realize that God hears the voices of all others. Carney and Long lift up three key words: love, heard, and call. For God, these three words are in the proper order; love, heard, and call. However, for us they fall in the reverse order; we call upon God who hears us and in that process, shows us love.

The Psalmist goes on to beautifully express the human condition by saying: "I suffered distress and anguish. Then I called on the name of the Lord: 'O Lord, I pray, save my life!""(Verses 3 -4) We do not know what specific struggles were faced by the author of this Psalm, but we can gather that they were serious, even life threatening. In my mind, this is part of the lasting power of these passages of scripture; they speak to us no matter the specifics of our own situation. Since they were meant to be part of corporate worship there is also a communal aspect to these prayers. Carney and Long also remind us that we need not be eloquent or wordy in our prayers. Like the Psalmist we can simply pray "O Lord, I pray, save my life!"

Whether we cry out to God as individuals, communities, or nations, God hears our voice. God's love impels us to hear the voices of one another too. May we find, and share, the joy that comes from truly being heard by one another and by God.

Spiritual Practice Scribble Drawing

WELCOME OUR GOD WHO IS EVER WITH US. OFFER A PRAYER. CLOSE YOUR EYES, CLEAR YOUR MIND, RELAX YOUR BODY. OPEN YOUR EYES. ALLOW THE MATERIALS AND COLORS TO CHOOSE YOU.

In one continuous motion, draw a loose scribble on your paper. Allow the line to travel around and overlap in places.

You may do this with your eyes closed. You may try this with your nondominant hand.

Stop and gaze at your scribble, perhaps placing it a distance away.

Watch for images or objects to emerge. With a darker pen, go over the lines that have meaning.

Add additional lines if you wish. Copy over just the lines that have meaning on another sheet of paper if you wish.

Add color to sections.

On the back, write down anything of meaning and date the work. Give it a title.
