Psalm 86

A Prayer of David.

¹ Incline your ear, O LORD, and answer me,

for I am poor and needy.

² Preserve my life, for I am devoted to you;

save your servant who trusts in you.

You are my God; ³be gracious to me, O Lord,

for to you do I cry all day long.

⁴ Gladden the soul of your servant, for to you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.

⁵ For you, O Lord, are good and forgiving,

abounding in steadfast love to all who call on you.

⁶ Give ear, O LORD, to my prayer; listen to my cry of supplication.

⁷ In the day of my trouble I call on you,

for you will answer me.

⁸ There is none like you among the gods, O Lord,

and bow down before you, O Lord, and shall glorify your name.

because you, LORD, have helped me and comforted me.

Reflection

"Meditation for 3rd Sunday after Pentecost"

"Prayers of Lament"

You have probably noticed that one of my go-to books in the bible is the Psalter. The Psalmist has a way with words that often expresses the heart of my prayers so much better than I can. Psalm 86 is classified as a "Prayer for deliverance from personal enemies" or "a Psalm of Lament." Biblical scholar, and one of my seminary professors, Bernhard Anderson notes in his book Out of the Depths: the Psalms Speak for us Today that the lament is the most common type of song in the Psalter. He goes on to say that God's people often found themselves in the interim between God's promises and the fulfillment of them.

Today, many of us may find ourselves in a similar "interim" place as well. As we navigate through our lives, and particularly through these times of Protest and Pandemic, we may feel like offering our laments as the Psalmist did. Our reading from Psalm 86 invites us to do that very thing.

Anderson goes on to point out that "lament" may not be a good word, it tends to imply a pessimism, "a bemoaning of a tragedy which cannot be reversed." In the Psalter this is not the sense. There is a sense of confidence that the situation can be reversed if God wills to intervene. A lament is really an appeal to God's compassion to intervene and change a desperate situation. Anderson offers a general structure of a Prayer of Lament which can guide us in our own prayers:

- 1. Address to God
- 2. Sharing our Complaint-naming and identifying our situation, including our feelings
- 3. Confession of Trust in God-that God hears us and responds to our prayers
- 4. Petition-what do we want?
- 5. Words of Assurance
- 6. Vow of praise no matter what happens in our lives and world

While participating in a recent Zoom meeting on Resilience, I was reminded of the importance of sharing our feelings and experiences with others. It is in naming and sharing our feelings that we acknowledge and embrace a situation, the good and the bad. As we share and embrace our feelings and experiences, we are empowered to move on. The Psalmist reminds us of how important it is to do this with God, to share our feelings, experiences, and hopes. Like the Psalmist we can do this knowing that God hears us and loves us enough to respond. The challenge is when God may not respond in the ways we hope. But, it is still critical to openly share our hopes and prayers. This process of lament enables us to embrace life fully, the blessings and the challenges alike.

In these challenging times, may we follow the path provided by the Psalmist as we share our laments with our God who loves and hears us.

Spiritual Practice

Pray and Work

Cultivate an attitude of mindfulness to-ward daily chores so that you can see God in them. Take a moment to pray over the tools of your day, to give thanks for them, or to ask for their proper use, whether a mop, paint-brush, or high technology. The computer may or may not crash, but you might develop the gift of patience needed to handle the situation.

Use technology to help you in your devotional life. Set up your screensaver with a meaningful Bible verse or quotation from a spiritual writing. Make your computer wall-paper a scene from nature that reminds you of God's creative power. Each time you have to enter a password, make it a word of religious importance to you - the gifts of the Spirit, one by one, will keep you going for a long time!

Consider this variation on the Celtic prayer for starting a fire as you turn on your computer:

For the God of Life: turn on your computer tower;

For the God of Peace: turn on your monitor; For the God of Grace: turn on your printer.

Brother Lawrence, a 17th century Christian Carmelite found in his thirty years of serving as a cook that the kitchen was a fruitful place for practicing the presence of God:

"The time of business does not with me differ from the time of prayer, and in the noise and clatter of my kitchen, while several persons are calling for different things, I posses God as in great tranquility as if I were upon my knees."
