Scripture Readings

Psalm 149

Romans 13:8-14

⁸ Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. ⁹ The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' ¹⁰ Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.

¹¹Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; ¹² the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; ¹³ let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. ¹⁴ Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Reflection *Meditation for 14th Sunday after Pentecost*

"A New Wardrobe"

Perhaps Paul was not the only one worried about the end of times. There are voices today crying out with certainty, convinced that we are in the "End Times" now. Wildfires ravage the west, the most powerful hurricane to hit the Gulf Coast laid waste to that region, riots continue around our nation, and the COVID-19 pandemic rages on with no end in sight. It might be tempting to believe that the times Paul predicted are here. Paul's reason for citing his belief in the coming "End Times" was not meant to frighten people; he wanted to urge his readers to wake up and look around. He urged those in the early Church to move away from the darkness and put on the armor of light. He went on to tell them to "put on the Lord Jesus Christ." His words stuck me as I thought about our current context. What would it mean for us to put on the armor of light and put on the Lord Jesus Christ?

It could be tempting to shrug off everything that is happening by saying "it's the End Time and there's nothing we can do about it!" Paul did not give the early Roman Christians that way out, nor does he give it to us today. The sense of the "End Times" impelled Paul to act. While there is so much darkness swirling around us, as there was in Paul's time, we are called to live our lives in the light of God's love. As people who put on the armor of light we do not deny the presence of the darkness, but we do affirm that the light is more powerful. Light enables us to see things as they are and makes it possible to shape the present and the future guided by God's love and presence.

While surrounded by darkness it is easy to have the sense that we are all alone. During a recent sleepless night, I was struck at how lonely it is to be up and about while much of the world sleeps. This experience may be different if one is a night shift worker or a "Night Owl." However, I still remember working many night shifts as a staff chaplain when I had that sense of isolation and loneliness as the rest of the world slept. The darkness can fool us into believing we are all alone and the arrival of the dawn is a welcome sight. Light enables us to see those around us.

In these days of COVID, however, many of us may have that sense that even in the light, we are still alone. As we put on the Lord Jesus Christ, we are reminded that He is with us and we are never truly alone. This awareness of God's presence in Christ also enables us to act in love. I suspect some of our isolation in the darkness of life today has to do with that growing sense that the world is divided between "us" and "them." When we clothe ourselves in the armor of light and put on the Lord Jesus Christ, we are able to see that it is really "us" and "we." Bound together in God's love we are able to respond in ways that highlight the light and love of God.

It might be tempting to escape into thoughts about the "End Times." There are times that abiding in the darkness can be a good thing. But, when we put on the armor of light and "put on the Lord Jesus Christ," we are empowered to experience the world as a place of light and love in which we all live. In these challenging times, may we be inspired by Paul's words to actively pursue the light and embrace the love of God that is here for us all now and always.
