# Scripture Readings

# Joshua 3:7-17

<sup>7</sup>The LORD said to Joshua, 'This day I will begin to exalt you in the sight of all Israel, so that they may know that I will be with you as I was with Moses. <sup>8</sup>You are the one who shall command the priests who bear the ark of the covenant, "When you come to the edge of the waters of the Jordan, you shall stand still in the Jordan." ' <sup>9</sup> Joshua then said to the Israelites, 'Draw near and hear the words of the LORD your God.' <sup>10</sup> Joshua said, 'By this you shall know that among you is the living God who without fail will drive out from before you the Canaanites, Hittites, Hivites, Perizzites, Girgashites, Amorites, and Jebusites: <sup>11</sup> the ark of the covenant of the Lord of all the earth is going to pass before you into the Jordan.<sup>12</sup> So now select twelve men from the tribes of Israel, one from each tribe. <sup>13</sup>When the soles of the feet of the priests who bear the ark of the LORD, the Lord of all the earth, rest in the waters of the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan flowing from above shall be cut off; they shall stand in a single heap.'

<sup>14</sup>When the people set out from their tents to cross over the Jordan, the priests bearing the ark of the covenant were in front of the people. <sup>15</sup> Now the Jordan overflows all its banks throughout the time of harvest. So when those who bore the ark had come to the Jordan, and the feet of the priests bearing the ark were dipped in the edge of the water, <sup>16</sup> the waters flowing from above stood still, rising up in a single heap far off at Adam, the city that is beside Zarethan, while those flowing towards the sea of the Arabah, the Dead Sea, were wholly cut off. Then the people crossed over opposite Jericho. <sup>17</sup> While all Israel were crossing over on dry ground, the priests who bore the ark of the covenant of the LORD stood on dry ground in the middle of the Jordan, until the entire nation finished crossing over the Jordan.



# 1 Thessalonians 2:9-13

<sup>9</sup>You remember our labor and toil, brothers and sisters; we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. <sup>10</sup>You are witnesses, and God also, how pure, upright, and blameless our conduct was towards you believers. <sup>11</sup>As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, <sup>12</sup> urging and encouraging you and pleading that you should lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.

<sup>13</sup> We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers.

# **Reflection** *Meditation for 22nd Sunday after Pentecost*

### "God's Presence, Might, and Protection"

We don't talk about it much in DOC circles, but there is something about the power of ritual. We may use different words for it, but there is a basic human need to remember and re-enact key events in our lives. We do this as we come together for holidays or birthdays. I think some of the challenge facing us during these days of COVID has to do with our inability to live into the rituals of our lives. As we face the upcoming holidays, many of us wonder if we will be able to gather with loved ones and friends in ways that have meaning for us. We may not call these events "rituals," but they are events that enable us to remember and re-enact key events in our lives. Our lives feel empty when we are unable to come together in these ways. As we mark All Saints Sunday, we come together to remember and celebrate the lives of those who have died.

We often resist the term ritual because of its negative connotations of repeated actions done without meaning. However, our text today from the book of Joshua reminds us of how important and life giving rituals can be. God called Joshua to step into the role of leadership left vacant by Moses' death. God went on to instruct Joshua and the people to enact a ritual to help them remember and celebrate their relationship with God.

In her reflections for *Lectionary Homiletics*, Roberta Rhodes from Austin, TX, reminds the reader that this passage was meant to evoke the crossing of the Red Sea. Just as the Red Sea crossing marked a new beginning for the Israelites, so too the crossing of the Jordan marked a new beginning for these followers of Joshua. They left behind their itinerant lives in the wilderness for a more settled life in this new land. Both events were the realization of promises made by God.

In this passage, Joshua was like a new Moses and he was God's choice. Even so, Joshua was no Moses. God commanded Moses to use his staff to part the Red Sea. Here, Joshua instructed the priests to be the ones to part the waters. Joshua assured them that this ritual was intended as a reminder that God would continue to lead them and go with them. God was preparing a place for them. Just as God was present in the past, God remained present in this new phase of their story. Rhodes goes on to remark that the Ark "passed by" the people just as God passed by on the initial Passover. This ceremony was intended to remind the people of God's deliverance. "Both acts of passing by serve as signs of hope to the people." Rhodes went on to say.

Our friend from previous reflections, Kirsi Stjerna, also comments that this story can be a testimony to the might, protection, and presence of God in all times and places. The Ark was a physical manifestation of God's presence, might, and protection. While the manifestation of that reality changed over time, the reality of God's presence, might, and protection remained. As people of faith who follow Christ, we also have rituals and symbols that remind us of God's presence, might, and protection. As we gather around the Table for worship we are reminded of God's presence through Jesus and his supper with those he loved. As we gather on All Saints Sunday we are reminded of all those who have graced our lives and have been witnesses to God's love and presence.

We need not turn away from ritual and symbol as long as we remember that they point us to a greater reality. As we ponder gathering with loved ones during the holidays, we are invited to remember and celebrate the love we share. The challenge of these times may be that we are invited to ponder the rituals and symbols that have enriched our lives. Hidden in these times may be an invitation to imagine and create new rituals. Our passage today guides us to always consider how the rituals and symbols of our lives point us to the love and presence of God.

What rituals could we create that help us remember and celebrate the presence, might, and protection of God? The God who made promises to our ancestors long ago is the God who continues to abide with us now. We, like the ancient Israelites, can trust in the promises of God whose presence, might, and protection are still with us today and will guide us into the future.
