# Scripture Reading

## Isaiah 64:1-9

<sup>1</sup>O that you would tear open the heavens and come down,

so that the mountains would quake at your presence—

<sup>2</sup> as when fire kindles brushwood

and the fire causes water to boil to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

<sup>3</sup> When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.

<sup>4</sup> From ages past no one has heard,

no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you,

who works for those who wait for him. <sup>5</sup> You meet those who gladly do right,

those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned;

because you hid yourself we transgressed. <sup>6</sup> We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth.

We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away.

<sup>7</sup> There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you;

for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity.

<sup>8</sup> Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand.

<sup>9</sup> Do not be exceedingly angry, O Lord, and do not remember iniquity for ever. Now consider, we are all your people.

<sup>4</sup> I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, <sup>5</sup> for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— <sup>6</sup> just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— <sup>7</sup> so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>8</sup> He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

## **Reflection** *Meditation for First Sunday of Advent*

### "Hope in the Face of Penetrating Hopelessness"

Professor Brad Braxton from Wake Forest Divinity School noted in his reflections on this passage from Isaiah in Lectionary Homiletics that "In the midst of a penetrating hopelessness, this prophet cries out to God." Isaiah preached to the ancient Israelites who had been in Exile for decades. He told them that their Exile was finally coming to an end. As they prepared to return to their land and Temple, amidst their excitement and joy was still some grief for all that they had lost. Deep wrenching questions filled their hearts and minds; had this time in Exile changed them and was their relationship with God forever changed? They longed for answers and for a visit from God. They had to rediscover their identity.

In many ways we find ourselves in a similar Exile. As COVID continues, we pray an end to come soon but we are assailed by many questions and concerns. Has this year changed us? What kind of relationship do we have with God now? Who will we be after all of this is over? Who will we be as individuals, as a congregation, and as citizens of a nation and world? COVID has taken us into a "penetrating hopelessness." We are weary, frustrated, and angry. In the midst of all this we continue to have personal experiences of "penetrating hopelessness." We continue to face illness or injury. Death has not been a stranger either; we have faced the death of loved ones in our lives and in our congregation. And, as if all this is not enough, we find ourselves in the midst of the holidays which often brings our grief and pain to the surface. Our awareness of the "penetrating hopelessness" in our midst and all around us affects us. Like the ancient Israelites, we too long for signs of God's presence. We ache for signs of hope.

Advent is an unusual time, a time of paradox when we are invited to embrace hopelessness and hope. We are invited to recognize this paradox. First, we have to slow down and spend some time in reflection and prayer. This Advent, in the midst of COVID, may present a unique opportunity to do just that. This holiday season will not be marked by the usual activities and events of years past. This Advent, here at FCC and in our Region, we are using a devotional written by our General Minister and President Rev. Terri Hord Owens. We have sent out this material for your own personal use and there will also be opportunities to participate in a Wednesday Zoom study. In addition to these devotional opportunities, we will continue with in-person and virtual worship. As we slow down and embrace the paradox of Advent we are invited to recognize and embrace our need for God.

Although Advent embraces hopelessness and hope, it is hope that has the final word because God is faithful and always present. So do not be afraid to acknowledge and embrace the hopelessness that is all around us. But embrace and share the hope and promise of this season. God is with us, amidst the hopelessness, bringing us hope and joy as we await God's incarnation in a baby born in Bethlehem.
