Reflection *Meditation for First Sunday of Advent*

"Comfort for Our Wilderness Journey"

"Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God," The prophet's voice rings out across the ages and is undoubtedly as powerful today as it was then. Isaiah brought words of comfort to a weary people bowed down by their time in the wilderness of exile. Altogether, their time in the wilderness of exile would last 150 years. Think about that, last year FCC celebrated 150 years of mission and ministry. Throughout these generations, the people feared that God would remain silent and they felt incredible hopelessness and despair. Scholars agree that this passage from Isaiah dates to the time when King Cyrus signed an edict permitting the exiles to return home. Such actions brought comfort, but, there was more to it. With these words not only did comfort come to these weary exiles, but God commanded comfort. The word "comfort" can be either a verb or a noun. As a verb, comfort means to give strength and hope. As a noun, comfort means consolation, freedom from pain or trouble. God proclaimed that the exiles were given strength and hope as their time in the wilderness was coming to an end. God also brought consolation and freedom to the people. These words of comfort were not simply meant as a gift to wilderness weary people. The prophet prompted the people to share this proclamation with others.

As we move through our own wilderness of COVID, what words of comfort do we hear and share? Where do we receive strength and find hope? I find some comfort in the realization that "A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD" God called the ancient Israelites to prepare the way of the Lord while in the wilderness, they did not have to wait to do so once they were beyond exile. With God's help and guidance they were called to prepare while in the wilderness of exile.

Today we are also called to prepare, even within our wilderness of COVID. Like the ancient Israelites, we are called to prepare here and now. The prophet gave clear guidance on what these preparations entailed. The prophet went on; "make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain." Obstacles are to be removed and the pathway is meant to be level and easy to traverse for all people. Nothing will remain that obstructs access to God.

Rev. Jill Duffield, editor of the Presbyterian Outlook, went on to comment that one of the striking parts of this passage for her was the next phrase. "Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken." In these days of isolation what a powerful reminder, we are not alone. Even in the midst of our wilderness, God's glory will be revealed to everyone. Although this is glorious news, the prophet did not end there. The prophet went on "He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep." What wonderful mages of love and tenderness! Even in the midst of our isolation and physical distancing, the prophet reminds us we will experience God's glory and tender love together, even, and especially, in the middle of our wilderness journey. Good News indeed!
