Scripture Reading

Isaiah 61:1-11

¹The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed,

to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners;

² to proclaim the year of

the LORD's favor,

and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn;

³ to provide for those who mourn in Zion—

to give them a garland instead of ashes,

the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit.

They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory.

⁴ They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

⁵ Strangers shall stand and feed your flocks, foreigners shall till your land and dress your vines; ⁶ but you shall be called priests of the LORD, you shall be named ministers of our God; you shall enjoy the wealth of the nations, and in their riches you shall glory.

⁷ Because their shame was double, and dishonor was proclaimed as their lot, therefore they shall possess a double portion; everlasting joy shall be theirs.

⁸ For I the LORD love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them.

⁹ Their descendants shall be known among the nations,

and their offspring among the peoples;

all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the LORD has blessed.

¹⁰ I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God;

for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels.

¹¹ For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord GOD will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

Reflection

Meditation for Third Sunday of Advent

"Rejoice, This is the Year of the Lord's Favor"

This third week of Advent is commonly "Gaudate" Sunday, which means "rejoice." Philip E. Thompson, pastor at Roberts Chapel Baptist Church in Pendleton, NC commented in Lectionary Homiletics that "To rejoice is more than just being happy. 'To rejoice' is to engage in a radical act and to adopt a certain stance toward God and humanity." During this week of "rejoicing" we are invited to hear these familiar words from the prophet Isaiah. For many of us these are familiar words that bring joy to our hearts. When we hear them we may hear echoes of the 4th chapter of Luke when Jesus read this passage in the synagogue in Nazareth. For many of us it is a challenge to hear this prophecy apart from Jesus' call to ministry. But, what was it like to hear these words when uttered by the prophet? How might that original setting influence our hearing of these words today?

As we have mentioned throughout Advent, Isaiah brought the word of God to exiled and weary Israelites. The good news that their exile was ending rang in their ears, and at the same time, their fears and anxieties about what they would find upon their return weighed on their hearts. They carried memories of the past and hope for the future simultaneously. The prophet declared:

"The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor,"

One can see how these were powerful words for the exiles, cause for rejoicing. David Mosser, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Graham, TX also commented in *Lectionary Homiletics* "The text announces that God is eager to reverse Israel's previous misfortune. There is to be a new day for those steadfast and faithful to Yahweh's promise."

The prophet's words made two things clear: first, God will build up those returning from exile by declaring a year of Jubilee, a time when everything begins afresh. Slaves were freed, the land was returned to its original owners, and debts were forgiven. It is a new beginning for Gods people. And secondly, God would build up Zion/Jerusalem once again.

But, how are these words of good news for us today? As we make our way through the exile of COVID-19, we yearn for joy. We have set aside many of the usual trappings of our lives and of this season. We know our exile will come to an end eventually, but how do we find joy now. As God proclaimed a year of Jubilee for the ancient Israelites, I believe our text today invites us to consider how our present times may be a time of Jubilee as well. Perhaps this time away from all the usual trappings of our life and of this season invites us to think about how we might find this as a time of new beginnings. As we step aside from "business as usual," how might we use this time to consider how we could begin again. Perhaps this time in our lives and our world could be seen as an opportunity to "reboot" and "begin anew."

As we share the good news of God's presence in our midst, we share our memories of the past and our hope for the future. As we share this good news we offer words of hope to the oppressed and those held captive. Just as God rebuilt the people of Israel, God continues to rebuild us. Perhaps 2020 is the "year of the Lord's favor" after all.
