Isaiah 61:10-62:3

¹⁰ I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God;

for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels.

¹¹ For as the earth brings forth its shoots,

and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up,

so the Lord GOD will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

62¹For Zion's sake I will not keep silent,

Reflection *Meditation for the 1st Sunday After Christmas*

"Choosing and Chosen"

As we move past Christmas and toward the New Year, we are eager to embrace the new beginning offered by this time of year. There is something about the wonder of new life as we witness it in the birth of a baby that prompts us to embrace the new as well. Offers surround us to "make a new you in the New Year." We may feel particularly tempted to embrace a new beginning as we move away from 2020 and all the challenges presented by this year of pandemic and protest. We yearn to know that 2021 will be nothing like 2020.

The new Christians in the church in Galatia also yearned for a new beginning. Paul assured them that things would be different now as they committed to follow the way of Christ. In fact, they would be different now too. Paul told them that through the birth, life, and death of Jesus they have been invited to embrace a new way of being. Paul told them that God had chosen them in a new and unique way. Paul used the image of adoption to describe this new way of being. Paul wrote to the Galatians to remind them that adoption is meaningful for everyone involved; for the adopted and those adopting.

The dictionary listing for the word "adoption" tells us that this word comes from the Latin and means "to choose." To adopt means to take by choice into a relationship. In the Roman world of Jesus' time, adoption was not relegated to children; Roman patricians often adopted adults, particularly when dealing with property and inheritances. For Paul, we have been adopted, chosen by God. Through God's incarnation as the Christ, God now includes not only the children of Abraham but also welcomes Gentiles. Now everyone is part of God's family.

In this year, when it feels as though so many of our choices have been taken from us, how might embracing the Good News that God has chosen us change things? We can't make the choice to move about freely, unencumbered by masks and physical distancing. Our choices are limited when it comes to spending holidays not only with close family, but with friends and neighbors. Choices to go to the mall for some shopping or dine out at our favorite restaurants are hindered As we move through this year full of protests, we have had to confront all the ways in which many people in our past and present have been robbed of even the most basic choices. In the midst of all these challenges we are invited to ponder the importance of choosing in our daily lives and throughout our lifetime. We are reminded that most of us have many choices, including the ability to choose our responses and reactions to what is happening in our lives and in our world today.

The choices we do make seem even more important in the face of all these realities. What a joy to realize that God has freely chosen us, each and every one. God began by choosing to send his Son Jesus to be born, live, and die as one of us. In the midst of those choices, God continues to call us and choose us. Not only does Christmas offer us a new beginning, but, because of Christmas, each and every day is a reflection of God's choosing us. Embracing this reality as sons and daughters of God we are empowered to make choices too; for God, for one another, and for ourselves.

Joy to the World


