He answered, 'Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do.' And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons.

Reflection

Meditation for the 5th Sunday after the Epiphany

"The Daily Rhythm of Life"

In our reflections on last week's passage from Mark, we pondered a story about the life and ministry of Jesus. That story began by describing a typical Sabbath day for Jesus and his Disciples. Although it evolved into quite an encounter, full of yelling and confrontation, it began as a typical Sabbath day with worship in the local synagogue. In our passage today, Mark went on to describe a typical, non-Sabbath, day for Jesus. Such a day contained four key elements:

- ♦ Worship and teaching in the local synagogue
- Responding to pressing needs for care and healing by those close to him
- Retreat for prayer and rejuvenation
- Reaching out to new people and seeking opportunities for new ministry

With this story the author invites us to ponder what constitutes a typical day for us. We are invited to consider the rhythm and pattern of our lives today. Just as Jesus began his day with worship, which included time with the scriptures, we are also invited to begin our day in a similar way. With that foundation we are able to respond to the needs around us; in our families, church, and community. Like Jesus, after a full day of loving service we also need to retreat for prayer and quiet time with God. All this equips us to reach out to new people and to serve in new ways. This pattern is not just meant for us as individuals, it describes the patter of life for a community as well.

But, given our present reality with COVID-19, such a life pattern is not really possible. Or, is it? In these days of isolation and self-quarantine, how do we structure our days? In many ways the structure remains the same, it's the contents that look so different. We are still invited to begin our days in prayer and worship, particularly our Sabbath days. Some of us are able to gather in person, but many of us participate in worship virtually or through the written word. It could be tempting to discount these other forms of worship, but they are still worship none-the-less. Our foundation is still God's word, we still open ourselves to God's Spirit. I suspect many of these components will remain even after COVID is simply a memory.

It is the next phase of a typical day that might be the most altered by our present circumstances. How do we respond to the human need that still surrounds us. In some ways we might be more attuned to the needs around us, particularly in our families and faith communities. We may find ourselves with a little more time to hear and respond to the needs of those around us. Without many of the usual activities in our lives we may discover more time to listen to the news, read the paper, or browse through the latest edition of the FCC Messenger. Instead of seeing friends and family and travelling to various places, we may find ourselves Zooming more often. We may not be able to respond in the ways we have in the past, but we still respond.

During Advent many of you did the "Reverse Advent Calendar" which involved gathering together food items for those in need. It was an impressive response, it took several people to gather up the bountiful boxes of foodstuff! Our prayer list is always growing as well, as we all learn of so many people in need. Cards and phone calls have gone out to those in our congregation especially hit hard by the isolation of self-quarantine. Undoubtedly, our response looks different than that of Jesus and the Disciples, but it is as powerful.

Although we may find ourselves isolated more than usual, we still need to make time and space for God. Hopefully, we are able to do this on a daily, weekly, or monthly basis. However we do this, we, like Jesus, must make time and space for prayer and reflection on God's word. During Lent we are all invited to use the daily devotional "Go to Jerusalem" which will be sent to everyone in the congregation. We will also have a weekly study on Wednesday evening which will invite us to think about the intersection between what's happening in our world today and scripture.

Finally, our text today invites us to move on and engage in ministry with others. Jesus and the Disciples went to the next town. Where will we go? As we begin to ponder the future, life in the next stage of COVID, we are invited to question where God is leading us now. Jesus told the Disciples; "let us go to the neighboring towns." What is the "neighboring town" for us here at FCC?

May we be emboldened and empowered to embrace the rhythm of life demonstrated by Jesus. Even in these unusual times we are still invited to be grounded in worship and prayer, called to respond to those in need, invited to make time and space away with God, and urged to go out and seek new opportunities for ministry.
