And he was transfigured before them, ³ and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. ⁴ And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. ⁵ Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' ⁶He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. ⁷Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!' 8 Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

⁹ As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Reflection

Meditation for Transfiguration Sunday

"The Power of Love"

As we move from the season of Epiphany to Lent, we cross the threshold of the Transfiguration of Jesus. This story gives us a glimpse of what awaits us once we make it through our annual pilgrimage in the wilderness of Lent. We have a taste of Jesus' glory which will be fully experienced on Easter Sunday. In this well known passage from scripture, we have a striking story. As is the custom of Mark, the story is told concisely. Jesus took three of his beloved Disciples, Peter, John and James, to the mountain top. It would have been enough of a miracle to witness the change in Jesus, but there was more. They also saw Moses and Elijah, two giants and pillars of their faith.

Why them? Of all those who could have made an appearance, why was it these two? Commentators tell us that Moses symbolizes the Law and Elijah the prophets. The Law represented more than simple mandates about morality and behavior. The Mosaic Law was the very foundation of their faith. As one of my pastoral colleagues put it, the Legalists who upheld and followed the Law did so because they wanted things to remain the same. But, Moses was not the only figure to join Jesus on that mountain, the prophet Elijah shows up too. Elijah was the pre-eminent prophet. He represented God's call to push the boundaries of life and the Law. The prophets constantly pushed the people of God beyond their comfort zones. While they stood firmly on the Law, they urged people to hear the Word of God in new and challenging ways. So, here was Jesus, right in the middle. He stood between the foundation and stability of the Mosaic Law and the invitation to push the boundaries of God's call on human life.

Just as Jesus stood between these two figures, we are invited to do the same. How do we honor the foundations of our life and faith?

How do we recognize and honor "what has always been? At the same time, how do we allow ourselves to push the boundaries? In many ways we stand between these two dynamics as well. We do this regularly as a congregation. Recently, we marked our 150th anniversary. We celebrated the foundations of our faith and of this congregation. But we know that we cannot simply live in the past. We are challenged by the prophetic word of God that calls us to push our boundaries and move out of our comfort zones.

In many ways, our current circumstances have placed us in this awkward position. As we quickly approach one year in a world dealing with COVID-19, we stand in this liminal space. We are keenly aware that we yearn for what has been, we want to stand firmly on the foundations of our life and faith. And yet, at the same time, we have been pushed to the edges of our comfort zones. Many of us may feel as though we have been pushed beyond our breaking point.

So, what gave Jesus the courage to stand in this space? I suspect it was the voice of God, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him." Did you notice? Once the voice spoke Moses and Elijah disappeared. Jesus stood alone. He now embodied both the Law and the Prophets. On this Valentine's Day, we are reminded of the power of love. The power of God's love for the beloved. God's love for Jesus and for each of us. That kind of powerful love enables us to also stand amidst the Law and the prophets, in that space between what has been and what may be. Not only did that kind of love transfigure Jesus, it changes us too.
