# Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

# Mark 8:31-38

<sup>31</sup>Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. <sup>32</sup> He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. 33 But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

<sup>34</sup> He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. 35 For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. <sup>36</sup> For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? <sup>37</sup> Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? 38 Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

# Reflection

#### Meditation for 2nd Sunday of Lent

#### "New People with New Paths to Follow"

In his book Wishful Thinking: A Theological ABC, author and pastor Frederick Buechner commented; "If my name were different, I would be different. When I tell somebody my name, I have given him a hold over me that he didn't have before." Our passage today from Genesis demonstrates the above sentiment made by Buechner. God's new covenant with Abram and Sarai was symbolized by a name change. Everyone in this story, including God, took on a new name which symbolized a new identity. God came to Abram and Sarai and clearly told them who they were becoming in God's sight. With a name change God made it clear that Abraham and Sarah would be the father and mother of many generations and that they now had a special relationship with God. In fact, as a part of this new identity and relationship, God also made a name change. God was now to be called El Shaddai. This is generally translated as "God Almighty" but it literally translates into "God of the mountain." Abraham, Sarah, and God entered into a new relationship that would change all of them from that point forward.

In the verses just before our Gospel lesson for today, Jesus asked the Disciples "Who do people say that I am?" They had several responses; John the Baptist, Elijah, or one of the prophets. Then Jesus asked them "But who do you say that I am?" In his famous, and probably infamous, reply Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." In our passage for today Jesus really continued with this line of inquiry, he described for the Disciples and others listening who he was. In our Gospel lesson we have Jesus' identity statement. In Mark, Jesus used a common phrase to describe himself, Son of Man. He told them "the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again."

His answer was so shocking and unpopular that Peter immediately tried to silence him. Jesus rebuked him and said "... you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." Jesus did not shrink from who he was and what he was called to do, even though those around him could

not perceive his God-given identity. Jesus' identity was not marked by a name change, but by the addition to his name, in Hebrew Messiah and in the Greek Christ.

Jesus did not stop there with the description of his identity, he went on to describe the new identity for those who follow him. Jesus told them "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it."

As we ponder our new identity it is so easy to get hung up on the idea of "denying ourselves" and miss the message for us today. J. Harold McKeithen from Hidenwood Presbyterian Church in Newport News, VA in his article for Lectionary Homiletics said that the true meaning of self-denial is not self-hatred or self-rejection. He pointed out that "self-denial" is really "self-relinquishment." "It is the relinquishing of oneself to Christ in the interest of receiving a greater and fuller self." When Jesus talked about "self-denial" he urged those listening, even and especially us today, to move away from "self-centeredness." In our devotion today from Go to Jerusalem the author Mary Alice Muligan wrote that our passage today invites us to "follow" Jesus wherever that might lead. The challenge for most of us is that we are accustomed to leading and not following.

Embracing our new identity will be challenging. It was challenging for Abraham and Sarah, for Jesus and for the Disciples. In these unprecedented times with COVID may we take the opportunity to ponder who we are and who we are becoming. As Muligan prayed in our devotion "It sounds awful, Human One, to go through what you predicted, so please strengthen me to be able to follow."
