## Scripture Reading

## Isaiah 25:6-9

<sup>6</sup> On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear.

<sup>7</sup> And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations;

<sup>8</sup> he will swallow up death for ever. Then the Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the Lord has spoken.

<sup>9</sup> It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the Lord for whom we have waited;

let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation.

## Mark 16:1-8

<sup>1</sup>When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. <sup>2</sup> And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. <sup>3</sup> They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' 4When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. <sup>5</sup> As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. 6 But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. <sup>7</sup> But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' 8 So they went out and fled from the tomb. for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

## Reflection

### Meditation for Easter Sunday

"Jesus Saves!"

An email circulated a few year ago about an ongoing argument between Jesus and Satan. Each of them was convinced that he was the best at working on a computer. God had finally had it and declared that a contest would be set up between them that would run for two hours. At the end of the contest God would examine the results and declare the winner. At the appointed time, each of them sat down at their computer and they began. They did everything you can imagine; they used their mouse, they created documents, they sent emails and added attachments, they created spreadsheets and Power-Points, they did everything possible on a computer. Suddenly, there was a flash of lightning and a roll of thunder and, you guessed it, the power went out. Satan sat and stared at the blank screen in disbelief. Once the power returned they each restarted their computers. Satan sat dejected and screamed "it's gone, it's all gone!" Then he looked over at Jesus who was printing off all his work. Satan screamed "wait, he obviously cheated! How can it be that he has all his work?" God just shrugged and said "Jesus saves."

Fortunately, that simple statement is Good News for us today; we are assured that "Jesus Saves." Both of our scripture lessons today remind us of God's salvific work for humanity. The prophet Isaiah reminded an exile-weary people "It will be said on that day, Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the LORD for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation." In our Gospel lesson, the messenger at the tomb assured the women that Jesus had been raised from the dead and that he would go before them to Galilee. Through the death and resurrection

of Jesus, God brought the salvation promised to humanity earlier. God's salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus opened up the future for the women at the tomb and for us today.

Like the women at the tomb, we are called into this new future, no longer bound by the past. I find it striking that Mark's account of the resurrection ended with the empty tomb. We do not have any resurrection appearances; after chatting with the young man in the tomb, the women flee in terror and amazement. Perhaps the intent of the author of this Gospel was to create an opening for this new future brought about by the resurrection. The young man pointed the women to a future in which they would encounter the Risen Lord. The encounter in Galilee would be a familiar place but Jesus and the Disciples would all be changed.

Just like the women at the tomb we are invited into an open future. We are called to live as Easter people which means trusting that Jesus leads us into that future. We may meet Jesus in familiar places, but we are all changed. This is particularly true this Easter as we move through this year of pandemic. We know we have all been changed and that the future is open and uncertain. However, it is through this open future that we come to experience the real depth in the simple assertion that Jesus Saves! Although grounded in the past, we are invited to let Jesus lead us into the future. We are also reminded that this new future is meant for everyone. It's really that simple, Jesus saves!
