### **Reflection** *Meditation for the 3rd Sunday of Easter*

#### "Truly Startling News, Indeed"

Have you ever noticed? The longest season of the church year, outside Ordinary Time, is Eastertide. The word "tide" can refer to "a period of time" or it can refer to rising water levels. It often refers to the highest level a body of water can attain. The season of Easter stretches from Easter Sunday until Pentecost which is the 23<sup>rd</sup> of May this year. Lent is 5 weeks and Advent and the season of Christmas are about 5 or 6 weeks. The length of Easter tells us a lot. Eastertide reminds us of the centrality of Easter and the events that occurred then. The raising of Jesus from the dead is the core event in the Christian life and the high tide of our faith.

The resurrection of Jesus is also the event that stirs up the greatest mixture of feelings and thoughts. Throughout these 7 weeks we hear the many versions of the resurrection as told by the different Gospel writers and the author of the Acts of the Apostles. Each version of the story tells us something different, but there are some shared elements. One element that weaves its way throughout the various stories is the mixed reaction of the witnesses.

In our passage today we are told by the author of Luke that the Disciples were "startled and terrified" when Jesus stood in their midst. I wonder if Jesus suspected that their response would be mixed because he began this encounter, as well as many of the others, with the phrase "peace be with you." Admittedly, this was and still is a common greeting in the Middle East, but I cannot help but wonder if there was more to it than that. Perhaps he knew they would be "startled and terrified" so he made a point of greeting them with the sign of peace. It also seems clear that they would not know what to make of his presence. The only conclusion that seemed consistent with their knowledge at the time was to assume that he was a ghost.

With this in mind, Jesus worked hard to demonstrate that he was physically present with them. He was not a ghost or an apparition. To prove it he showed them his once wounded hands and feet and then he ate with them. The resurrection was so new and unexpected that Jesus has to repeatedly show them and us what it really meant. Jesus has been bodily raised from the dead and exists in a radically new way. Startling and terrifying news, indeed.

So, what does the resurrection of Jesus mean for us today, more than 2000 years later? In many ways we still come to experience this Good News of the resurrection by being "startled and terrified." When we think about it, we have to admit it is still pretty startling news. It is something that is challenging to understand unless one has experienced the Risen Christ. As we gather for worship and spend time with God in our own times of prayer we, like the Disciples, find our minds opened as we study scripture. As we look around us and see the signs of new life, we have glimpses of this startling event. Perhaps the Good News of the resurrection resonates for us in a new way as we begin to make our way through the pandemic towards a sense of new life. We still carry the terror of all that has happened to us and our world, but we are reminded that the final word is God's. New life does arise even in the midst of pandemic. Like the Disciples we are called to witness to the new life all around us. We are called to share the fulfilled promise of God that life in Christ triumphs over death. We are able to lay aside our terror and embrace the startling news of God's ongoing presence with us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Undoubtedly we will need all these Sundays of Eastertide to absorb this Good News.
