Scripture Reading

Psalm 138

Of David.

I give you thanks, O LORD, with my whole heart;

before the gods I sing your praise; I bow down towards your holy temple and give thanks to your name for your steadfast love and your faithfulness;

²⁰and the crowd came together again, so that they could not even eat.²¹When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, 'He has gone out of his mind.' ²²And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, 'He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons.' ²³And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan?²⁴If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand.²⁵And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. ²⁶And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. ²⁷But no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his property without first tying up the strong man; then indeed the house can be plundered.

²⁸ 'Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven for their sins and whatever blasphemies they utter; ²⁹but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal sin'— ³⁰for they had said, 'He has an unclean spirit.'

³¹Then his mother and his brothers came; and standing outside, they sent to him and called him. ³²A crowd was sitting around him; and they said to him, 'Your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, asking for you.' ³³And he replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' ³⁴And looking at those who sat around him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers! ³⁵Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother.'

Reflection Meditation for 2nd Sunday after Pentecost

"Agents of Healing and Forgiveness"

As I read over the passages for today, I was particularly struck by our Gospel lesson from Mark. When Jesus shared the first parable which began in verse 24, I felt a deep resonance. Jesus said "If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand." I was not the only one who felt that resonance with our text and our own times. John Wurster, pastor of St. Philip Presbyterian Church in Houston, shared a similar awareness in his article for the Presbyterian Outlook. Wurster pointed out:

> His (Jesus) observation that a house divided against itself cannot stand not only gave Abraham Lincoln a moral foundation for the healing of the nation, it also serves as an indictment of the seemingly growing divisions in our common life. From the usefulness of masks to the necessity of vaccines, from the conduct of police to the definition of infrastructure, from the legitimacy of elections to the role of the press, dissension deepens in our life together. How much more division can we endure before the house falls and crushes everyone?

Wherever one stands on any or all of those issues may vary, but the one thing on which we can all agree is the presence of division. So, what binds us together? Where can we find healing and unity? Jesus gave us some guidelines for that very pursuit. As his followers we are invited to listen on. Wurster went on to say that the second parable of Jesus offers us more guidance.

> The strong man is the root cause that must be addressed in order for meaningful progress and lasting change to happen. The strong man can be a structure or a stereotype, a prejudice or a falsehood, a memory or a regret. The strong man is that which holds us captive, continually exerting influence and accumulating power. Whatever form it may take, tying up the strong man

requires persistent courage and committed truth-telling, following the example of Je-sus himself.

Jesus did not stop here with this final parable, he went on to talk about the heart of the matter. forgiveness, which is something that binds all humanity together. But Jesus did this in a way that was troubling for many and is still a challenge for us. Later in our passage Jesus went on to talk about blasphemy against the Holy Spirit, the unforgiveable sin. This verse has always troubled me; I have been sure that at some point in my life I probably did this, albeit unknowingly, and will never be forgiven. Fortunately, commentator Professor William L. Lane explained this passage in a way that made sense to me. Lane explained that this portion of the Gospel has to be taken in context. Lane said: "blasphemy is an expression of defiant hostility towards God." Jesus intended to challenge those who said that he was motivated by Satan. Their refusal to recognize the reign of God in the life and ministry of Jesus was blasphemous. Their denial of the power and greatness of God as shown through Jesus was basically blasphemy. Here, blasphemy was the conscious and deliberate rejection of the saving power and grace of God released through Jesus' words and actions.

Finally, as this passage drew to a close, Jesus lifted up one more quality of unity. What binds us together is the awareness that we are all part of God's family. "And looking at those who sat around him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother.""

Finding and bringing about healing in the midst of our divisions will be a challenge. It will take work, courage, commitment, and persistence. As family we can do it. Jesus invites us to join in the work of healing and forgiveness and invites us to do so as part of his family.
