 $^{\rm 10}\,{\rm Finally},$  be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. <sup>11</sup> Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. <sup>12</sup> For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. <sup>13</sup> Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. <sup>14</sup> Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. <sup>15</sup> As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. 16 With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. 17 Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

<sup>18</sup> Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. <sup>19</sup> Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, <sup>20</sup> for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

## Reflection

## Meditation for 13th Sunday after Pentecost

### "Evil is Real but Not the Victor"

When I was a teenager I was intrigued by all the buzz around a book that later became a movie entitled "The Exorcist." My Mom said I was too young to either read the book or see the movie. Although I would see classmates with books in brown paper book covers that I knew were this forbidden item, I complied with my Mother's wishes and did not make an effort to read this "banned" book. I was in college when this movie was shown as a midnight offering and my friends and I eagerly attended. I was a young Christian then and remember leaving the film terrified. I could not, or maybe more accurately would not, sleep that night and spent the night reading Star Trek books. I was terrified by the images of evil I saw depicted in that movie. When I tried to talk with our chaplain about the experience, I made light of it and said "the devil has some real hygiene issues." I did not want to share the fear that had been stirred up within me. It became clear to me that the devil and evil was not something mainline Protestants discussed.

But, we cannot escape the reality that evil weaves its way throughout scripture and history. It was important for the Apostle Paul to prepare the young believers to whom he wrote. He shares a perspective that evil was very much a part of his reality. Perhaps this had something to do with the fact that he wrote this letter from prison. He was also undoubtedly shaped by the world in which he lived. Many depictions of ancient Rome are incredibly violent and probably fairly accurate. For many, especially those in the occupied territories of the Roman Empire, it was a dark and violent time. The militaristic imagery of this passage from Ephesians might make us uncomfortable today, but Paul's use of these metaphors drew on everyday sights and sounds for those to whom he wrote. It might be tempting for us to write off what he had to say as irrelevant for us today. But is it really?

As the author brings things to a close, the reader is urged: "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil." The author used the term diabolos in Greek, which is gets translated as "devil" but often means "adversary" when used in scripture. He went on to say: "For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places." I think the implication here is that evil is so much more than its frequent personification as the devil. Evil consists of cosmic forces that have plagued human beings throughout history and continue to besiege us today. The names may change over time, but these forces represent all that is contrary to God and

God's will for humanity. We have struggled mightily with these forces throughout the past year: fear, hatred, selfishness, and self-centeredness. We call these evil systems by many names: racism, sexism, homophobia, nationalism, and white supremacy. Like those in ancient Rome, we may feel powerless against all these forces that struggle against God. We may be tempted to sink into despair and give up.

But, our words from Ephesians remind us to take heart. We are called to stand firm in God's power. We have resources to fight the evil we perceive around us. Richard Carlson from Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, PA suggests in his article for *Lectionary Homiletics*:

"Thus Christians resist demonic attacks through truth, justice, right relationships, faith, trustworthiness, and the peace which the Gospel brings while at the same time launching their own counter-attacks through the utterance of the gospel through which the triumphal note of the divine peace brings those formerly held in demonic captivity into salvation and the peace of a new humanity in Christ."

Carlson goes on to remind us that another resource is prayer. This includes an attitude of dependence on God and an openness to the Spirit's direction. Donn F. Morgan from The Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkley, CA also comments in the same edition of *Lectionary Homiletics* that God is at war with the forces of evil, and as God's people we do not have the luxury of remaining uninvolved or neutral.

While the reality of evil is real, we do not fight it alone. We stand together with those who fight evil. We stand together as a denomination as we follow leaders like the Rev. Dr. William Barber who leads the battle against the evil of poverty through The Poor People's Campaign. We fight the battle against the evil of hunger when we support the CROP Walk. As we stand firm in the power of God, we are empowered to fight all that is evil. God has already won the ultimate victory against evil and God leads us in the battles against the evil that exists in our world today. Paul reminds us as this passage comes to a close, "To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints."
