Esther 7

¹So the king and Haman went in to feast with Queen Esther. ²On the second day, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, 'What is your petition, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled.' Then Queen Esther answered, 'If I have won your favor, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me that is my petition—and the lives of my people—that is my request. ⁴ For we have been sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be killed, and to be annihilated. If we had been sold merely as slaves, men and women, I would have held my peace; but no enemy can compensate for this damage to the king.' ⁵Then King Ahasuerus said to Queen Esther, 'Who is he, and where is he, who has presumed to do this?' ⁶ Esther said, 'A foe and enemy, this wicked Haman!' Then Haman was terrified before the king and the queen. ⁷The king rose from the feast in wrath and went into the palace garden, but Haman stayed to beg his life from Queen Esther, for he saw that the king had determined to destroy him. 8 When the king returned from the palace garden to the banquet hall, Haman had thrown himself on the couch where Esther was reclining; and the king said, 'Will he even assault the queen in my presence, in my own house?' As the words left the mouth of the king, they covered Haman's face. ⁹Then Harbona, one of the eunuchs in attendance on the king, said, 'Look, the very gallows that Haman has prepared for Mordecai, whose word saved the king, stands at Haman's house, fifty cubits high.' And the king said, 'Hang him on that.' 10 So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the anger of the king abated.

Reflection

Meditation for 18th Sunday after Pentecost

"A Holy Library"

Did you get to go to story time as a child? You went to the library, and sat criss cross applesauce on some colorful rug, and someone would read you a story. And if you were lucky you got someone who made up different voices for all the characters. I think sometimes as adults, we lose the magic of storytelling; of hearing a story anew, with a kind of childlike wonder. But, there is a very special way to get back to the heart of really good stories: go to the Bible. It is full of amazing stories and characters for us to enjoy and learn from. Our scripture today, from the Book of Esther, is a great example.

Esther is a rich and interesting tale, with wild and active characters. It starts with an arrogant King and a rebellious Queen. The rebellious Queen is replaced by a young, Jewish girl who, unbeknownst to her, is about to save her people in the kingdom. There is a loyal subject, who even though he is Jewish, stands by the King. We have an evil, over confident official who gets a little too big for his britches, and the whole story ends with a feast and a festival that is still celebrated today called Purim. There is sex, danger, loyalty, love, anger, revenge, courage – it really has it all.

In fact, I'm going to suggest, rather than settling for only the one scene we get today, that you read the whole Book of Esther yourself. It's short, easy to read, and a very, very good story. It's like a small novella stuck between lengthy historical tracts and the beginning of the wisdom books. The Book of Esther is really unlike anything else. It gives us so many lessons to work with. After you read it, the lesson which comes to the front for you will depend on you: your life, your experience, and what you bring to the story.

This is the beauty of our holy scriptures. It's not so much a holy book but a holy library, filled with stories, characters, times, and places that are so different than our own, yet so similar, too. This library holds the story of our God, how God creates and interacts with their good creation, the story of how we keep messing it up and God keeps saving us over and over again. Our bible is a holy library. There are many stories in it that you might not know, that might not get preached on Sunday, but they are valuable. There is no end to what we can learn when we dive into these pages. We can gain insight from the heroes, the victims, the villains, and even the bystanders. Each character has a purpose, each event moves the plot forward. The plot of how God acts in our lives. May we pray for the Holy Spirit to enrich our lives and engage us to be characters engaging in God's story.
