"Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the LORD had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring. <sup>12</sup> The LORD blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning; and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand donkeys. <sup>13</sup> He also had seven sons and three daughters. 14 He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. <sup>15</sup> In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters; and their father gave them an inheritance along with their brothers. <sup>16</sup> After this Job lived for one hundred and forty years, and saw his children, and his children's children, four generations. <sup>17</sup> And Job died, old and full of days.

## Mark 10:46-52

<sup>46</sup> They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. <sup>47</sup>When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' 48 Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!' 49 Jesus stood still and said, 'Call him here.' And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' 50 So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. 51 Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man said to him, 'My teacher, let me see again.' 52 Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

## Reflection

### Meditation for 22nd Sunday after Pentecost "Confident and Persistent Before God"

It seems like a lot of people really thought this Bartimaeus guy was a real pain in the "you know what." He does not come off well in this story. He seems a bit obnoxious and pushy. In this short passage, we learn a lot about this man. Unlike many biblical characters, he had a name. We also learn that he had a father, telling us something of his heritage. We know his profession, a beggar, and we learn he lived in Jericho. So, we might ask "why is he so important?" "Why does he get so much attention from Jesus?" "Why does his story get told?" "What does his story have to teach us today?"

Everyone in this story just wanted to keep him quiet. He was being a bit annoying and embarrassing with all his yelling. But all he wanted was to be heard and seen by Jesus. I suspect those around him were asking, "Who was this guy anyway and who did he think he was that he should be noticed by Jesus?" I bet many of them thought "how rude!" He just kept calling out to Jesus even as others yelled at him to be quiet! I have to admit it, I rather like this guy and I think we could learn a lot from him and his story.

I wonder if he got noticed and the author recorded his name and story because Bartimaeus is intended to be a model of faith. For starters, he was persistent despite the discouragement of others. He also asked for what he needed. He overcame the shame of having needs. Bartimaeus demonstrated a sense of confidence in God, not reliance in himself. Once he had this direct encounter with Jesus, he made a commitment to serve and sacrifice for others. I think Bartimaeus calls out to the best in each of us as individuals and as a community as well.

We also learn a great deal about Jesus.

Jesus took the time to really see and listen to this stranger. Jesus spoke with him and did not make any assumptions about what he sought. Jesus directly asked Bartimaeus, "What do you want me to do for you?"

So, how might the story of Bartimaeus inspire us and deepen our faith? Like Bartimaeus we are invited to be persistent. This may require us to call out for the help we need. It is so tempting to withdraw and keep silent when our needs are not immediately acknowledged or met, but we are encouraged to keep calling out. Hopefully, we will not need to be quite so obnoxious, but our persistence may be seen that way by others. Perhaps the most significant lesson in this story is the reminder to place our hope and confidence in God, not in ourselves. We are shown how to trust in an incarnate God who yearns to respond when we call out. We can learn from the response of Jesus who invites us to take time to see and listen to others. We are also inspired not to make assumptions but to ask questions and listen to the answers.

May we be emboldened like Bartimaeus to be confident and persistent even in the face of discouragement. May we trust in God and hold firm to the reality that we are seen and heard by an incarnate God who knows and embraces our struggles. May this inspire us to serving God and one other.
