Ruth 3:1-5, 4:13-17

¹Naomi her mother-in-law said to her, 'My daughter, I need to seek some security for you, so that it may be well with you. ² Now here is our kinsman Boaz, with whose young women you have been working. See, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing-floor. ³ Now wash and anoint yourself, and put on your best clothes and go down to the threshingfloor; but do not make yourself known to the man until he has finished eating and drinking. 4When he lies down, observe the place where he lies; then, go and uncover his feet and lie down; and he will tell you what to do.' 5 She said to her, 'All that you tell me I will do.'

¹³So Boaz took Ruth and she became his wife. When they came together, the LORD made her conceive, and she bore a son. ¹⁴ Then the women said to Naomi, 'Blessed be the LORD, who has not left you this day without next-of-kin; and may his name be renowned in Israel! 15 He shall be to you a restorer of life and a nourisher of your old age; for your daughter-in-law who loves you, who is more to you than seven sons, has borne him.' 16 Then Naomi took the child and laid him in her bosom, and became his nurse. 17 The women of the neighborhood gave him a name, saying, 'A son has been born to Naomi.' Reflection

Meditation for 24th Sunday after Pentecost "Grateful for the Saints in Our Lives"

I love the story that unfolds in the book of Ruth. Part of my affection probably stems from the fact that it was the only book in the Hebrew Bible that I was able to study in the original Hebrew. Since it is a short book, we were able to study it in my seminary Hebrew class and complete our study in one semester. I also love this short book of the Bible because it is told from the rare viewpoint of women. Ironically, God is rarely mentioned anywhere in this book, however, it is clear that a life grounded in God is the thesis of this story. So often we fail to recognize that the story is not the only central issue, it is also critical to consider who tells that story. This latter reality really hit home for me as I prepare to see the musical "Hamilton." As Teri McDowell Ott says in her commentary on Ruth for the Presbyterian Outlook, ""Hamilton" makes it clear whose voices aren't included in the dominant narrative of American history and that it matters who tells your story." As we reflect on the story of Ruth, we, too, are invited to consider the storyteller along with the story she told.

Although many couples choose a reading from an earlier part of this book for their weddings, this is really a story of tragedy and resilience. Ironically, the main character and narrator of this story was Ruth, the daughter in-law of Naomi. How many mothers-in-law come off so favorably in the eyes of their daughter-in-law? The story begins in Israel with the move of Naomi and her husband Elimelech to the land of Moab. Things start off well; Naomi and her husband have two sons who find wives in their new home. Sadly, tragedy sets in and Naomi's husband and both sons all die, leaving Naomi and her two daughters-in-law alone and without re-

sources or protection. With nothing to keep them in Moab, Naomi decides to return to her own country hoping to begin again. Ruth chooses to make the journey with Naomi and they hope to build a new life together. As Ott points out in her commentary, "Naomi and Ruth act on a plan to secure their futures with the little power and resources they have."

As the story draws to a close, we learn that Ruth and Naomi were able to secure not only their own future, but they create a path that will lead into the future for generations. While there are some troubling elements to this story around how all this happens, the basic theme is the way they worked together to create a legacy and a future.

I wonder how many of us can think of Ruths and Naomis in our own lives. On this All Saints Sunday, we take time to celebrate those in our lives who, like Ruth and Naomi, shared our journeys and helped us secure our futures to prepare for an ongoing legacy. Today we celebrate those saints from our community who have died in the past year. As we do so, we are also invited to recognize and celebrate the lives of those we have known who have been important parts of our journey. Together, Ruth and Naomi laid a foundation for their own lives and gave birth to a son that would be the ancestor of one of the most loved biblical characters, David. Like Naomi and Ruth, may we hold tight to one another in the good times and the bad. May we be strengthened by the saints in our lives and sustained by the presence of God.
