²⁸ Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. ²⁹ And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. 30 Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. 31 They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. 32 Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. 33 Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. 34 While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them: and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. 35 Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' ³⁶When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

Reflection

Meditation for 8th Sunday After Epiphany

"Listen to Him!" by Pastor Kelly Tyrrell

How many of us, at one point in our lives, have found ourselves yelling, "Would you just listen to me?" "You're not listening to me!" Or my favorite from Chris Tucker in Rush Hour, "Do you hear the words that are coming out of my mouth?" We do it to our kids, our co-workers, and our spouses, but why? Everyone wants to be heard. Being heard is essential to our identity, our feelings of value, worth, and validation. Listening to truly understand the person speaking, not to respond, is one of the most primary ways we can recognize the dignity of others.

The part of our scripture that jumped out at me was verse 35, "Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" Upon reading this verse, my mind instantly went back to the other crucial time God interjects: Jesus's baptism. In January, we read from Luke 3, where in verse 22 "A voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

I imagine in our scripture today a frustrated and fed up God saying, "Seriously? I told you he was my Son. And you didn't listen. LISTEN to him!" God thought they had made themselves clear that Jesus was the Emmanuel, the manifestation of God's will on earth, the living example of how to bring the kingdom come. Did God actually have to tell us to listen to Jesus? Wasn't that implied? And not only implied, but owed?

The author Emma Justes connects listening to Christian hospitality. In her book Hearing Beyond the Words: How to Become a Listening Pastor, she starts with hospitality as the foundation of all good listening. Justes identifies four core qualities of Christian hospitality: vulnerability in offering hospitality to strangers; humility to fulfill someone's needs without bragging or boasting; thoughtful availability, or being ready to serve and anticipate the needs of our guest; and reciprocity, or the importance of receiving unexpected gifts from our guest with grace. We know in Scripture hospitality is expected of us, radical hospitality, for stranger and neighbor alike. Could listening be expected of us in the same way? Have we ever expressed hospitality like this? Have we listened to someone like this? When I read Justes's work, I came away feeling like maybe listening is an act of obedience to God.

To give us a model of what "good" listening might look like, I want to borrow from the wisdom of Stephen Ministers. Stephen Ministry is a program to empower the laity of churches to offer spiritual caregiving to people in need. Here are some of the ways Stephen Ministers are trained to listen well: 1. Listening happens best when we find a quiet place to have our conversation, limiting distractions.

- 2. Listening is a verb: it is active and requires personal involvement and being fully present.
- 3. The good listener allows for holy silence.
- 4. Listening requires more than hearing the words, body language is important. Listening for what goes unsaid can be just as important to understanding as what is said.
- 5. Listening can hasten understanding best when the listener asks gentle yet probing questions.

How well do we listen to this passage? How do we, as contemporary Christians, hear the Scriptures? First, do we create a quiet space for ourselves when we engage with this story? Are we fully present when we hear this story? When we read the Scripture, were we picturing the story in our minds? Holy silence is a little trickier, but do we allow time without words to calm our minds? What about the nonverbal clues in our Scriptures? Like Peter, do we overlook the obvious, physical, visible signs in our stories; or do we try to read between the lines as we listen? What questions do we ask of ourselves, of God, when we encounter a story like the Transfiguration?

Focusing on the *how* of listening applies to all parts of our lives: in our relationships, our prayer life, our engagement with Scripture. In life, you will encounter all kinds of messages from all kinds of people, some that you'll happily entertain and others that make you cringe. But we still have to listen. Listening is the primary way that we recognize the dignity of other people. Listening is akin to Christian hospitality. Listening is our way of showing humility and vulnerability to both strangers and neighbors. Listening is an act of obedience to God. "Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!"
