Scripture Reading

Isaiah 55:1-9

¹ Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat!
Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price.
² Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not sat-

isfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good,

and delight yourselves in rich food. ³ Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live.

I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David.

⁴ See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples.

⁵ See, you shall call nations that you do not know,

and nations that do not know you shall run to you,

Luke 13:1-9

¹ At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. ²He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? ³No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did.⁴ Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.'

⁶ Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. ⁷ So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" ⁸ He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it. ⁹ If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down." '

Reflection

Meditation for the 3rd Sunday in Lent "From Division to Renewal at the Table" By Pastor Leigh Lestina

Have you ever struggled with reading your Bible? When I read the Bible for the first time at age thirteen, I was shocked to find out what was in there! I've also struggled to love my neighbors as myself. This seems so basic, but contention, gossip, and condemnation are easier to find than love. As Christians, we are called to read our Bibles, pray to our Creator, and serve and love those around us. With the invasion of Ukraine, we are called to pray for the Ukrainians, but do we pray for those in downtown Lincoln? Because we should!

Just as a fig tree shows its ripe and ready for the picking, so too does a Christian show their willingness to follow Jesus, wherever that may be. Whether it's in the poorer parts of Downtown Lincoln or at a wealthy private school, we are commissioned to follow Jesus and bear fruits of the Spirit. During the Lenten season, Christ showed the fruits of the Spirit as God lived in him, witnessing the love of God. Do we witness the love of God? Do we not only feast with God, but welcome all others to Christ's table as well? A part of being a Christian is judge not – do not play God. Turn from the darkness of judgement and toward the light of God. Just as Christ did not condemn those suffering to be awful sinners, so too we should not condemn those suffering far worse conditions to be damned sinners.

Isaiah and Luke play on this theme of repentance and renewal. There is a feast,

there are fruits of a fig tree, and there is a lack of condemnation by God. Just as Pastor Karen talked about how if we are in Christ, then judgement passes from us, so then, too does judgement cease from our lips. Instead, God asks us to repent, or turn from our sins, including judging others, to be ready for Christ's death and resurrection. His death and resurrection are the hope that we as Disciples of Christ live with, where at baptism we walk in newness of life. My question for you, then, is this: Where do you need to be renewed by God?

Because where there is division in your heart, let there be renewal. Where we are swayed to and fro with our contention, let us come to God with the hope of Easter: Renewal with God at the Table.

May compassion be our guide and our God be our witness that the love of God – *agape* – can be found in us. Do not judge, and we will not be judged, be patient as God is patient, and all of us, including me, need to be Christ to others. Just as I might struggle to do the basic Christian things – love, read my Bible, pray – it's okay to struggle! Our goal, as we've talked about in Youth Group, is to serve those on the outskirts of our churches, our towns, our cities, and in ourselves as being Jesus the Christ – Jesus the bringer of good news. So, let's love with the steadfast lovingkindness that only comes from God!
