Scripture Reading

Acts 9:1-6

¹Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' ⁵He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.'

John 21:1-19

¹After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ²Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

4 Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' ⁶He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. ⁸But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

9 When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' ¹¹So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. ¹²Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. ¹³Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. ¹⁴This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

¹⁵ When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' ¹⁶A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' ¹⁷He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. ¹⁸Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' ¹⁹(He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

Reflection

Meditation for the 3rd Sunday of Easter

"Lord, You know that I love you!"

During our recent Elders meeting we discussed chapter 11 in the book Christian Caregiving: A Way of Life by Rev. Kenneth C. Haugk. This chapter was entitled "Confession and Absolution over the Back Fence." While the language of confession and absolution is not a regular part of conversation, particularly for Protestants of the Disciples persuasion, it is an important part of our faith heritage. Those of other traditions use this language to describe a process meant for everyone. Our story from the Gospel of John is an excellent example of this important process. The interchange between Jesus and Simon Peter may not be described in the usual way that confession and absolution are portrayed, nonetheless, this is an excellent expression of those ideas. Haugk said:

> Confession and absolution is the process whereby one person communicates the burden of his or her sin to another, and the other person, in turn, shares with the burdened individual the good news that God has forgiven the sin and promises to heal the brokenness.

In our story today Simon Peter unwittingly enters into this process with Jesus.

As they shared the Last Supper together Jesus told Simon Peter of his impending denial. While Simon Peter could not grasp that this was possible, it did happen. As we all remember, it was predicted that Simon Peter's denial would come three times and it came to pass. Now as Peter encounters the Risen Lord not only does Jesus acknowledge the threefold betrayal, he offered three-fold absolution and forgiveness. Jesus offered the healing of their relationship and brought healing to Simon Peter's soul. Although the author tells us how hurt Peter was, he walked through the process anyway. In this process Jesus demonstrated what a challenge true forgiveness and absolution can be. At times it may take more than one time to confess and hear the words of absolution. For Peter it happened in one encounter with Jesus, however, it may take many times for us to completely move through the process. Jesus did not leave things there. Jesus also shared the new call on Peter's life. Peter was being called to shepherd and care for God's people. Jesus called Peter to feed and tend the lambs and the sheep.

Simon Peter's encounter with Jesus undoubtedly tugs at our hearts, it certainly tugs at mine. Our sin may not seems as dramatic as Peter's denial of the Lord, but our sins may weigh as heavily on our hearts and minds. Each of us has undoubtedly done things that have wounded relationships or hurt people we love. As we ponder this encounter between Jesus and Peter those instances in our lives may rise to the surface. Like Peter, we may need to return to those occasions more than once, or once may be enough. Sharing these experiences with Jesus may bring closure, but as Haugk pointed out in the chapter mentioned above, sometimes we need to share this process with another person. The significance of our story today can be found in the invitation to enter into this process. We are urged to come to Jesus, no matter what separates us from others or from God. Like Peter we may be asked "do you love me?" No matter how painful or how long it takes, we are invited to respond as Peter did. "Lord, you know that I love you." Every time we open our heart to God we are empowered to do it again. May we have the courage and tenacity of Simon Peter to answer over and over again "Lord, you know that I love you."
