Scripture Reading

I Peter 1:3-9

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, ⁵who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, 7so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. 8Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, ⁹ for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Reflection

"Keep your fork" *The 5th Sunday after Pentecost*

Often times, we humans "hope" for things that may or may not happen – great stock market gains; lost dogs coming home; people being completely cured of serious disease. When those things don't happen, we begin to wonder "where is God" OR "why is this happening to me?"

In Peter's day, as well as 2022, we Christians were (are) in danger of giving up faith when faced with difficulties. There are three ways to respond to discouragement:

We can abandon all hope

We can pretend things aren't that bad We can believe that it's all part of something bigger than life – that life here on earth isn't the end!

Abandoning all hope leads to bitterness and total despair.

Pretending things aren't that bad shows itself with naïve optimism or intentional blindness to other's suffering for sure and something to our own.

Believing the present moment of despair is part of something more – no matter what happens in this life, Christ has won for believers an inheritance in heaven that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading.

Often times at the end of a meal, we are told to "Keep your fork" (K.Y.F.) – a wonderful reminder that something better is coming. This is true for us and our life as well – Christ has promised "the best is yet to come." When you are discouraged and overwhelmed, find a fork and hold on tight – a subtle but powerful reminder that everlasting life, eternity means THE BEST IS YET TO COME!
