Reflection

"Not a Competition" Meditation for the 6th Sunday after Pentecost

This may come as a bit of a shock to some of you, but I was a real bookworm as a child. Well, I guess I still am. My brother used to torment me regularly by exclaiming "why don't you do something instead of just sitting there and reading all the time?" So, I have to admit that the first time I heard this story from Luke I felt vindicated. I felt like I finally found my faith sister. I was okay because I was just like Mary and Jesus praised her for choosing to sit at his feet and listen to his teachings. Although I felt vindicated I also felt a bit uneasy. As a woman I was regularly told it would be better if I were more like Martha. While Jesus seemed to praise Mary, the world in which I grew up praised women who acted more like Martha. I suspect many of you tend to gravitate to one character in this story or the other. One does not have to be a woman to identify with the women in this story. Although I revel in my identification with Mary, I often found myself uneasy about having to choose one character over another. Dr. Jane Schaberg, Professor of Religious and Women's Studies at University of Detroit Mercy in Detroit, Michigan, commented in her article on Luke in the Women's Bible Commentary that many people are uncomfortable with this story because it seems to pit sister against sister.

Even though this story is commonly read and interpreted in a way that seems to lift up Mary and put down Martha, a careful reading of the text does not support this common interpretation. In this brief story we are told that Jesus came to the home of two sisters, Mary and Martha, who were apparently well known in their community. Martha eagerly prepared for his visit by preparing food and probably cleaning their home before the arrival of their illustrious guest. As Martha frantically prepared she saw her sister interacting with their guest and not helping with the standard activities of hospitality. In frustration she came to Jesus and implored him to tell Mary to help her.

As I explored the text more deeply I was excited to realize that Jesus' response to Martha was closely followed by his comments to Mary. In reality, Jesus responded to Martha and then made a separate comment to Mary. The author of Luke said in verses 41 and 42 "But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing." We often link this passage to the portion immediately

following. However, Schaberg noted that this response was intended solely for Martha. As you know, the Bible was originally shared orally and then began to be written on scrolls that had to be hand copied. For the most part, the scrolls were all alike. However, at times there were scrolls that contained different versions of various texts, these difference were called "variant readings." When scholars translated the texts they usually chose the reading that fit best, but sometimes they read the "variants" to shed light on the scripture passage they were working with in translation. Schaber noted that there is a variant reading in our story that sheds light on Jesus' comments to Martha. In our translation used today Jesus said "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing." A variant reading said "few things are necessary." The implication is that Jesus was speaking about the menu. Like many people eager to provide ample hospitality, Martha has provided more than enough. Jesus was trying to give Martha a break and invited her to consider that she only needed to provide a few, or one thing, to satisfy the obligations of hospitality. Jesus extended grace to Martha hoping she would be kinder to herself.

Then Jesus turned his attention to Mary. Martha's request for her help was undoubtedly still ringing in Jesus' ears. In the closing verse of our passage Jesus said to both Martha and Mary "Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her." Sadly, the translation is a bit misleading. The Greek actually said that Mary had chosen "the good, or useful, part." The use of the word "better" once again pits sister against sister. However, the intent of Jesus was not to lift up Mary by putting down Martha. They each made choices that fit their personality best, one choice was not better than another. In the church we have undoubtedly noticed that we need both the Marys and the Marthas. Each sister brought their own gifts, just as each of us brings unique gifts to our life together. We need all those who are willing to provide hospitality in all its various forms. We also need those who sit and interact with our guests. In reality, each of us brings different gifts that enrich our community. The only thing lacking here at FCC is a "Mary Group" to go with our "Martha Group." When we move away from competition we no longer need to "pit" sister against sister or brother against brother. Jesus connected with each sister and valued them and what they each had to offer. May we find the grace to do the same. Amen
