Scripture Reading

Psalm 85

To the leader. Of the Korahites. A Psalm. LORD, you were favourable to your land; you restored the fortunes of Jacob. You forgave the iniquity of your people; you pardoned all their sin.

Selah

You withdrew all your wrath; you turned from your hot anger.

Restore us again, O God of our salvation, and put away your indignation towards us. Will you be angry with us for ever? Will you prolong your anger to all generations? Will you not revive us again, so that your people may rejoice in you? Show us your steadfast love, O LORD, and grant us your salvation.

Let me hear what God the LORD will speak, for he will speak peace to his people, to his faithful, to those who turn to him in their hearts.

- ⁴ And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us

And do not bring us to the time of trial.'

⁵ And he said to them, 'Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, "Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; ⁶ for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him." ⁷ And he answers from within, "Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything." ⁸I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs.

⁹ 'So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. ¹⁰For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. ¹¹Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? ¹²Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? ¹³If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'

Reflection

"Keep Praying" Meditation for the 7th Sunday after Pentecost

It is part of our worship every Sunday following our prayers and praises. It is part of our worship whenever we gather for special services like Christmas Eve and Maundy Thursday. We recite it when we come together at funerals, memorial service, and grave sides. For many of us it is also a part of personal prayer. There are various versions and translations of what we call "The Lord's Prayer" which sometimes creates a bit of a cacophony when people from various faith communities gather. As Christians it is often one of the first prayers we learn. I can remember trying to learn it in Czech when I lived in the Czech Republic. Like us, the Czechs have various versions and I never really learned it by heart, I usually needed to have a printed copy on hand. This prayer of Jesus shapes us and forms us throughout our lives. In his reflections for the Presbyterian Outlook John Wurster, pastor at St. Philip Presbyterian Church in Houston, Texas, remarked: "Jesus' reflections on prayer in this passage point beyond techniques, forms and styles. There are no magic formulas, no right words. When it comes to prayer it's not so much a matter of what and how and when. Rather, it's about who and why." He went on to say: "The "who" is each of us and all of us and God. Prayer binds each of us and all of us closer to God. Why do we pray? We pray to God because God is the one from whom all blessings flow. We pray to God because all that we are and all that we have comes from God's hand. We pray to God because in life and in death we belong to God."

I really resonated with what Wurster had to say when he went on to point out that all this sounds great when we are sitting here in church. We are in our beautiful sanctuary, ours ears still ringing with glorious music and we are still filled with God's holy Word and awaiting the joy of the Lord's super. What happens when we pray day after day and nothing happens? What do we do when everyone, our friends, family,

church family and acquaintances, prays and nothing seems to change? How do we face the ongoing illness, the death of loved ones, war around the world and all the injustice that swirls all around us? In verse 10 of our passage today Jesus said: "For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." Did Jesus mean it or are we somehow the exception? I suspect there are times in all our lives when we have felt overwhelmed and despairing and wondered why we should continue to pray.

Wurster summed it up well when he said:

Prayer is not about getting what we want when we want it. Prayer is about learning to trust God; it's about growing in relationship with God by voicing the cares of our hearts and sharing with God the joys and sorrows of our lives. Prayer is not the clenched fist demanding that our will be done; it is the open hand receiving God's provisions for this day. Prayer is the means by which we acknowledge that God is God and we are not.

Such an awareness grows slowly over a lifetime. The heart of prayer is that we keep praying. Whether we use the words of Jesus or our own, it is our willingness to pray during the good times and the bad that is an expression of hope and trust in God. Prayer is our willingness to share the joy and the pain with one another and with God. Being formed and shaped by the Lord's Prayer invites us to keep praying to God who provides for us and leads us closer and closer to one another and to God. We trust that God has us and the situations in our lives and world in God's hands. All we need to do is open our hearts and minds to God daily, in worship and in private. No matter what happens throughout life we are invited to "keep praying!"
