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

Scripture Reading

Psalm 80

To the leader: on Lilies, a Covenant. Of Asaph. A Psalm.

Give ear, O Shepherd of Israel, you who lead Joseph like a flock! You who are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine forth

before Ephraim and Benjamin and Manasseh.

Stir up your might, and come to save us!

Restore us, O God;

let your face shine, that we may be saved. O LORD God of hosts,

how long will you be angry with your people's prayers?

You have fed them with the bread of tears, and given them tears to drink in full measure.

You make us the scorn of our neighbors; our enemies laugh among themselves. Restore us, O God of hosts;

father against son
and son against father,
mother against daughter
and daughter against mother,
mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law
and daughter-in-law against mother-inlaw.'

⁵⁴He also said to the crowds, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain"; and so it happens. ⁵⁵And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, "There will be scorching heat"; and it happens. ⁵⁶You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

Reflection

"Choosing the Difficult Path" *Meditation for the 10th Sunday after Pentecost*

In the refrain for his popular song "We Didn't Start the Fire" Billy Joel sang "We didn't start the fire. It was always burning, since the world's been turning. We didn't start the fire. No, we didn't light it, but we tried to fight it." His song rushed to my mind as I pondered our Gospel lesson this week. I have to admit, I was really tempted to skip this passage. Perhaps it makes you feel as uncomfortable as it makes me feel. I do not like thinking of Jesus in this way. Division swirls all around us, every day and in many ways. There seems to be dissention in the political, religious and cultural realms of life. The divisions threaten to destroy families and undermine our most important relationships. With all that in mind, it was equally difficult to turn away from this text. Rev. Teri McDowell-Ott took on this passage in her reflections for the Presbyterian Outlook. Although she was also uncomfortable with this text, she knew it was important to reflect upon it and not run away screaming in the opposite direction. Her reflections really hit home for me when she pointed out: "In her Feasting on the Word commentary on this text, Audrey West writes that this passage in Luke is best understood in light of the whole gospel story, that "the passage is descriptive rather than prescriptive." Jesus does not intend to destroy relationships, West says, but "this sort of rupture can be the result of the changes engendered by Christ's work."" So often when we read the words of Jesus we immediately jump to the sense that what he said was meant to be "prescriptive" or even "predictive." We think Jesus is describing something that will happen in the future as a result of his coming and actions. In this case, it seems, Jesus identified a quality of the human condition. We seem to move toward division and dissention all too naturally. Perhaps Billy Joel had something there, it does seem that "we didn't start the fire. It was always burning, since the world's been turning."

So, if our passage is meant to be descriptive what does that mean for us? Those of us who

grew up in homes where there was a great deal of conflict may find ourselves particularly uncomfortable with this passage. It is tempting to avoid conflict at any question and we may believe it is best to remain silent and keep our opinions to ourselves. We may believe that it is our job to bring peace and harmony at any cost. We may think it our job to be like Switzerland during World War II, to stay neutral. McDowell -Ott reminds us that division is a part of human existence and we are called out of neutrality and silence. As followers of Christ we are often called upon to take sides and stand up for the hurting and the oppressed. In his willingness to carry and die on the cross Jesus always sided with the oppressed and calls us to do the same.

However, I think McDowell-Ott left out an important component in this discussion. While we are called away from silence and neutrality it is important to consider how we deal with the divisions in our lives and world. Despite our discomfort, we must take a stand and be willing to express our beliefs and convictions. However, it is critical that we do this in a way that fosters real conversation. Conversation involves a give and a take, listening and speaking. So often our disputes and disagreements move to shouting and name calling. No one wants to be a part of that kind of interaction. The challenge before us is; how do we remain true to our beliefs and, at the same time, remain open enough to listen to one another?

Silence and neutrality are not the path, but neither is yelling and name-calling. It takes courage to stand up for what we believe. It also takes courage to really listen to one another. In this time of division may we be strengthened by the witness and presence of Christ to stand up for justice and speak out against oppression. May we be as eager to listen to one another as we are to speak. May we be emboldened to truly listen to God.
