## Lamentations 3:19-26

The thought of my affliction and my homelessness

is wormwood and gall! My soul continually thinks of it and is bowed down within me. But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope:

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases,

his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning;

great is your faithfulness.

'The LORD is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.'

The LORD is good to those who wait for him,

to the soul that seeks him.

It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD.

# Luke 17:5-10

The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' The Lord replied, 'If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

'Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from ploughing or tending sheep in the field, "Come here at once and take your place at the table"? Would you not rather say to him, "Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink"? Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, "We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!" '

# Reflection

### "We can get along, and so much more" *Meditation for World Communion Sunday*

Rodney King's plaintive cry still rings out across the decades "Can't we all just get along?" Although it has become the focus of many jokes and parodies, his words still ring a chord today. Rev. Dr. Ron Allen, Disciple pastor and author of stewardship material for the denomination, commented in his reflections on our Gospel lesson for today that this sentiment from King is the foundation of the human hunger for community. The author of the Gospel of Luke wanted to convey the importance of community to the early church. While our text has some troubling images, the basic desire of the author was to describe the elements of a strong and vital community of faith. Allen went on to point out that for Luke "...community involves welcoming and integrating people from across the human spectrum who repent and seek together to live in mutual solidarity, in love, peace, justice, dignity, with abundance for all, and in covenant with the natural world." Allen went on to say that our Gospel lesson for today "... reminds us that stewardship has to do with all things that happen in and through Christian community and beyond."

Like last week, we need to remember that the omitted verses before our passage today provides an important context. Again, Jesus was talking with the religious leaders of the day. He used their perspective and behavior as a contrast for the early Church. The author of our text wanted to help the early Christians better understand what it meant to be a community of faith and why it was so important. Throughout the Gospel of Luke the intent has been to describe the community of faith as a part of the new realm of God. Coming together as a community of faith began with "getting along" but it encompassed so much more. A community grounded and empowered by God lived in the world of their time but also held onto a vision of life in the realm of God. Getting along was a beginning that, hopefully, led to a deeper awareness of God's call to include and enfold everyone. This new community based on the vision of God's realm embodied God's love, peace, justice, dignity and abundance. This newly

burgeoning community focused on what everyone had in common and, at the same time, celebrated the unique qualities of each of those who gathered.

On this World Communion Sunday we celebrate the worldwide communion of Christians who embody that kind of community. We honor our similarities and celebrate our differences. It is our text from the Hebrew scriptures that lifts up one of the core components of our worldwide community. Our text from the rarely read book of Lamentations articulates one of the core components of our human condition, the presence of suffering. This text is still read in many Jewish worship services as they lament the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem by the Romans in 70 C.E. While it was written in response to a particular incident, this short book often enables those who suffer to articulate their pain. As we gather today we are mindful of our brothers and sisters around the globe who suffer. While our suffering may be one way in which we connect, we are reminded that we also connect through the hope of our faith. In the portion of the book we read from chapter three, we are reminded that it is the foundation of hope and trust in God that binds us together as well. Like Christian communities all around the globe, today, we gather at this Table. We come from many backgrounds and beliefs. We worship God in many varied and different ways. We gather around the Table of hope. We gather as those who hope and trust in God.

As we gather at the Table we exemplify the answer to Rodney King's deep desire. At this Table we demonstrate the capacity "to get along." We also come as unique expressions of God's realm in our world today. We get along, but we know this is just the beginning for each of us. This unity is the foundation of our varied communities. We come as faithful and strong communities who rely on and trust in the same God. We represent many faith communities, we come to this Table in many different ways, but we all acknowledge that this Table is the focal point for us all.
