Reflection

"The End is NOT Near...." Meditation for 23rd Sunday after Pentecost

I have a cartoon I found several years ago that still makes me smile. A prophetic figure in a simple garment with sandals on his feet holds a sign that says "The End is NOT near-You Must Learn to Cope!" Our passage today from the Gospel of Luke is often referred to as a "Little Apocalypse." By this scholars mean that this text uses language and imagery about the end of existence as we know it and the in-breaking of God's reign. Rev. Dr. Ron Allen reminds us in his reflections on this text for the denominational stewardship material that "Luke 21:5-24 is written in the style of "prophecy after the fact." That is, Luke employs a convention from ancient literature in which the writer puts words foretelling the future into the mouth of a character, when those words actually refer to things that have happened or continue to happen." Although many people read this material literally, we are invited to consider the context of this passage and the literary style employed. I suspect passages like today's make many of us uncomfortable because we are uncertain about how they fit into our modern understandings of God and the Bible.

In many ways, the purpose of our text today was not to frighten us into belief but to bring us words of hope. Allen went on to point out that "The overarching function of this passage is to offer hope to Luke's congregation as it makes its way through a difficult present...The passage asks the community to believe that things happening in its world are signs that God is actively in the process of transforming the world. "While this is a specific literary style, as a part of scripture it also presents a timeless message. The "signs" we perceive today may be different in specifics, but the basic qualities remain. War, poverty, injustice, fear, separation, scarcity and apathy are all elements of human existence throughout time. Their specific expressions vary; war in Ukraine, inflation and poverty at home, racial injustice, fear of the other, the list goes on and on. The other basic quality that exists now as it did in the time of

Luke is hope. God continues to be active in the transformation of the world and invites us to be participants in that active transformation. Our stewardship is one way we can participate in that transformation. While reality today can be difficult and painful, as it was for those in the early church, Allen invites us to ask ourselves some key questions.

How would God like to transform these situations in realm-like ways?

How might our practice of stewardship point to God's realm-purposes in relationship to these signs?

What might we do to alleviate suffering in these situations?

How might we join God in trying to move the situation in the direction of the realm?

As we prepare to dedicate our pledges today we are invited to ponder how our stewardship will enable us, as individuals and as a congregation, to continue ushering in the realm of God. As our Finance Team prepares the congregational budget there will be some concrete ways in which we are invited to participate in God's transformation. Our budget will help shape how we use our resources to embody the realm of God; how we use our building, how we worship God, how we reach out to those in need in our community, how we care for members and friends, how we welcome people and how we live out the mandate to love one another. I believe reality may be closer to the depiction in my cartoon than we would like to believe. "The End is NOT near-You Must Learn to Cope!" Our hope comes in an awareness that not only must we cope with all that is happening in our lives and world, we are called to thrive and to invite those around us to do the same.

Scripture Reading

Isaiah 65:17-25

Luke 21:5-19

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth;

the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind.

But be glad and rejoice for ever in what I am creating;

for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight.

I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people;

no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it.

or the cry of distress.

No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime;

for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth,

and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed.

They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit. They shall not build and another inhabit; they shall not plant and another eat; for like the days of a tree shall the days of my people be,

and my chosen shall long enjoy the work of their hands.

They shall not labour in vain, or bear children for calamity;

for they shall be offspring blessed by the Lord—and their descendants as well.

Before they call I will answer,

while they are yet speaking I will hear.

The wolf and the lamb shall feed together, the lion shall eat straw like the ox; but the serpent—its food shall be dust! They shall not hurt or destroy

on all my holy mountain, says the Lord.

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.'

They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them.

'When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.
