

One: For the sake of my relatives and friends I will say,


Many: Peace be within you.

Sermon

From The Rev. Kara Hillhouse Luke 13:31-35 God's Grief

"Lament is the language of a broken heart. Lament is an expression of love. It is the language of love when we see bad things happen to our loved ones, when we watch people make tragic decisions, when disasters unfold and wars erupt" (Pastor Clarke Dixon). On the second Sunday of Lent, we find Jesus lamenting over Jerusalem: he's not angry, he's not hurt, and he's not resentful...just grieving. It's clear that Jerusalem is a beloved place to him, or else he'd respond much differently. In this story, "Jerusalem" can stand for many things (although the city itself was broken and unfaithful). "Jerusalem" can be a metaphor for the universal Christian church, religious leaders or people of faith, as on all levels we sometimes reject what God is desperate to teach us, just as Jerusalem killed the prophets. Lent is a good time to evaluate whether we are willing to hear what God is trying to teach us, or whether we've hardened our hearts towards him. Join us for worship, where we'll ponder this text anew, come to the Lord's Table and share in fellowship with one another. We'll see you Sunday!

Scripture Readings

Psalm 122

Luke 13:31-35

I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!" Our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem. Jerusalem built as a city that is bound firmly together. To it the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord, as was decreed for Israel, to give thanks to the name of the Lord. For there the thrones for judgment were set up, the thrones of the house of David. Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: "May they prosper who love you. Peace be within your walls, and security within your towers." For the sake of my relatives and friends I will say, "Peace be within you." For the sake of the house of the Lord our God, I will seek your good.

At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, "Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you." He said to them, "Go and tell that fox for me, 'Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed outside of Jerusalem.' Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, 'Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."
