I mentioned on Sunday that I spent most of last week at the New Melleray Monastery in Eastern Iowa. I'm participating in a two-year Preaching Cohort for a program called *Bountiful Preaching*. Our tenmember group has study retreats where we gather from our homes in Ohio, Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska, and bring in scholars to teach and inspire us to preach more bountifully. Our cohort is one of many from all over the Midwest, and beyond.

Rev. Dr. Matt Skinner led us in a study of the gospel of Matthew. He started the class off by saying, "To understand Matthew you have to have lived through a nasty church schism. You have to have lived through people actively sowing seeds of discontent; and not people far removed from you, but rather those closest to you. You wished they'd go away but they didn't." Schism. The opposite of unity. This class was timely, because I'm also currently taking a Disciples' History and Polity class, and one of the main goals behind the Stone-Campbell Movement (which led to the Christian Church, Disciples of Christ tradition) was Christian unity. The Disciples seek to be "a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world" (disciples.org).

Unity is a challenge for people, in part, because our brains appear to be hard-wired to notice differences. In the Scientific American journal, author Leslie Henderson writes about research that suggests that the human brain functions in ways that influence our reluctance to trust others, especially those who are not like us (that is, different races, different religions, etc.) But just because the brain influences how we see those who are different from us, she writes, doesn't mean we can't work to change this. "Activity in our brains is malleable, [meaning we can] modify the more primitive fear and reward systems to produce different behavioral outcomes." Henderson quotes author Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, who says that "the problem with stereotypes is not that they are untrue, but that they are incomplete. They make one story become the only story." And, going further, she draws upon social scientist Scott Page, who "provides mathematical evidence that although diverse individuals are less trusting of one other, when working together, they are more productive." The conclusion is that a diverse way of seeing things leads to better solutions than the most brilliant of like-minded experts.

So how do we build unity? I think we need to seek out opportunities to humbly learn from others, and the only way to do this is to build relationships with those who have different ways of living in and understanding this world, and the world yet to come. I was reflecting yesterday on what a blessing it has been for me to be part of diverse faith communities and cultures over the course of my life: from my Presbyterian heritage to my education at a Lutheran college; from my pastoring at a United Methodist, and now a Disciples of Christ, congregation; from my studying Hebrew at a Seventh Day Adventist university to working with Muslim Imams and Orthodox Rabbis. I am so so thankful I got to do all of this, and will continue to seek out ways to build bridges and learn how similar we really are, in the ways that matter.

I invite you to join me in this effort. Sharing God's love will mean finding ways to connect; and honoring God as a whole Creation will mean finding ways to unite. May you feel the love and joy of Christ every moment of this journey. Peace be with you!

July Outreach Opportunity

This past fall, First Christian became an active member of *Justice in Action*, an interfaith, grassroots coalition of faith communities in Lancaster County. Some of the churches that support *Justice in Action* are United Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, UCC, Quaker, Jewish and more. First Christian is the only Disciples of Christ church to commit to supporting this important faith coalition thus far. The goal of *Justice in Action* is to address ongoing systemic issues that significantly impact the wellbeing of our local community. It chooses three issues of concern, based on the input from the faith community members. It then forms research committees for all three areas of focus, and, in collaboration with community experts (including those from non-profits, education, healthcare, law enforcement and governing bodies), and other cities around the country who have worked toward similar goals, works to find a solution to them. Currently, the three areas of focus are:

- establishing a Mental Health Navigation System (similar to how cancer patients are now cared for), where people needing help will go through one point of contact, which will coordinate care with all needed resources and stay with the patients through the course of their care. 65% of Lancaster residents surveyed said mental health was one of their top three concerns for this community;
- 2) putting into place a Pre-Eviction Mediation System which will work with both landlords and tenants, to help keep low-income individuals and families from becoming homeless. Affordable rental housing for the 31,000 residents who earn less than \$40,000/year is scarce; and
- 3) implementing a Pre-Trial Diversion System for individuals who have committed non-violent offences, in order to keep them out of the Lancaster County Jail, and, taking into consideration defendant accountability and public safe-ty, restore them into the community. This not only saves tax dollars and helps to lower the overwhelming population numbers in our correctional facilities, but also addresses the underlying issues that led to the arrests. There is a disproportionate number of imprisoned individuals who are struggling with mental health and poverty, as well as significant racial disparity among the imprisoned.

In order to be a contributing member of *Justice in Action*, churches are asked to pay dues, based on the amount of each church's operating income. These dues go towards paying the wages for two employees, as well as other mission-oriented expenses. We are asking members to prayerfully consider contributing to our **July Outreach Opportunity**, which will be our *Justice in Action* membership dues for 2026, which are \$1,500. Dues will gradually increase over the next four years, until we reach the requested amount of 1% of our operating income.

Thank you for considering supporting this important work that will help make our community more healthy, just and Christ-like. If you are interested in becoming a part of our *Justice in Action* team, talk with Pastor Kara.

Jim Blosser shared the following message during worship on Sunday, July 13:

Ulysses S. Grant had been elected president but hadn't been inaugurated when a small group of pioneers gathered in the newly established village of Lincoln, Nebraska before it became an incorporated city. Along with Nebraska's first governor and perhaps the first chancellor of the university these committed Christians worshipped in the unfinished house of Pastor John Yearnshaw who arrived here in a covered wagon and established what we now know as First Christian Church. We've come a long way from a one room wooden church house to this beautiful facility here at 16th and K.

There's a reason this congregation has survived so many calamities and thrived for over 156 years. It's because faithful stewards gave their first fruits and we are recipients of these gifts. So now it's our turn to continue this vital and dynamic ministry here in the heart of our growing community.

Today we begin our stewardship drive for next year. It will culminate on Oct 26 when we dedicate our financial promises for 2026. The focus of this year's campaign "devoted to generosity" will make all of us more aware of how our financial contributions are used to love all, live spiritually, rejoice in hope and show hospitality. Over the next few months leaders of our worship, hospitality, outreach and communications teams will share how our gifts are used to make a difference in peoples' lives here in Lincoln and beyond.

But remember, stewardship isn't about money, it's how we live our lives and how we prioritize what God has given to each of us. Hopefully during this time we will all re-examine what we can do with our "first fruits" to make a difference. Make no mistake everyone has some kind of gift to share. As I speak, my wife D'Arcy, both daughters and 3 of our grand-children are at Kamp Kaleo. Without First Christian's undying support of that camp it would not be able to change lives as so many of us have personally witnessed.

First Christian has made a huge difference to our family and I can think of no better way to honor God and serve our Lord than giving our first fruits to this great congregation, knowing that every penny will be carefully and faithfully spent.

And finally, from my seat in the choir loft, every Sunday I'm fortunate to gaze at that great west window to see the symbols of all four gospel writers and of Peter and the Apostle Paul. And there in the center is Jesus, the good shepherd, reminding us to "Feed his Lambs". That window is a constant reminder of those great servants who gave their very lives to show God's love for all. We must continue that great tradition of spreading the Good News wherever we go.

The future here is bright, but only if we make it. So, whatever your gifts are, please be generous as God has been so generous to us.
