

One: Let us thank the Lord for God's steadfast love, For God satisfies the thirsty and fills the hungry with good things.


Sermon

From The Rev. Kara Hillhouse Luke 12: 13-21

Empty Abundance

One of my top two-if not my top-least favorite kinds of scriptures for me to preach on are those in which Jesus talks about money. I bet it's difficult for you too. It's difficult because I am privileged: I have a home, and I have money for bills and food (and non-necessities too, at times). I read Jesus' words and struggle to understand what I'm supposed to take away from what he said, and, honestly, I feel ashamed. But, as I study these scriptures, what I keep coming back to is that money, in and of itself, is not inherently evil. What matters is how we use it, and whether we are aware that our gain can sometimes be another's loss. In our text this week, Jesus shares the Parable of the Rich Fool. The final verse of his story shows God saying to the rich man, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God." The man had so much excess he had to build new barns in which to store it, while others went without. That was the sin. For us, today, to hear this text, we have to do some honest, probably pain-filled, soul-searching, about what we prioritize. But even in the midst of our struggles to understand, God is good! And what Jesus invites us to is a more joyful way of living. Join us for worship this Sunday, for a time of fellowship, rejuvenation, and God's Living Word. We'll see you at First!

Psalm 107: 1-9, 43

Luke 12: 13-21

"O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures forever. Let the redeemed of the Lord say so, those he redeemed from trouble and gathered in from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.

Some wandered in desert wastes, finding no way to an inhabited town; hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted within them. Then they cried to the Lord in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress; he led them by a straight way, until they reached an inhabited town. Let them thank the Lord for his steadfast love, for his wonderful works to humankind. For he satisfies the thirsty, and the hungry he fills with good things.

Let those who are wise give heed to these things, and consider the steadfast love of the Lord."

"Someone in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.' But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?' And he said to them, 'Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.' Then he told them a parable: 'The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?" Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, 'Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God.'"
