Advent is fast approaching—this year it begins on November 30th. Advent is a season that reminds us that the faith journey is all about waiting: we live in the "now" but also in the "not yet;" we wait for a Savior that has already been, yet is also still to come; we find our hearts both rejoice and hurt, yet we cling to the Promises our Savior made. And not getting the immediate satisfaction we want forces us to slow down, admit we're not in-charge, and wait upon the One who is. Pastor David Mathis writes about this, saying, "[W]aiting is no waste in God's economy. It is in the delays and the pauses, and in becoming aware of our lack of patience, that he works to save us from self-reliance and revitalize our faith and hope in him."

Waiting is no waste in God's economy. How different this is from the world around us, where busyness and decisiveness equals progress, and anything else is laziness. But we cannot deny that God tells us to wait upon him, so there it is. We'd best get comfortable. Thank goodness for Advent, a time to be still and wait in anticipation of all that God will do in our lives (all the while reflecting on all that He has done and is doing). So, let's settle in...this might take a while. And that's just fine. Be well, friends.
